It may be objected that capital is pretty largely represented on the ticket, but if all the candidates are men of reputed wealth their capital is not of the kind that seeks any aggrandizement by means of legislation, nor are the men themselves of the class who would do otherwise than protect the people's interests. Indeed, only a man who has a fair amount of surplus capital can afford to accept the mission to the constitutional convention, as it may fitly be described as "all work and no pay."

Republican Convention.

From our Bozeman Correspondent.

The republican convention for Gallatin county, called for the purpose of nominating candidates to be voted for on the 6th of November next, as delegates to the constitutional convention, to assemble at Helena on the 14th of January, 1884, and to elect delegates to the district convention, to be held at Bozeman to-day for the purpose of nominating one candidate at large, from that particular party, in accordance with the law passed last winter, authorizing said constitutional convention, was held at Bozeman on the 13th inst., and resulted in the choice of the following well known gentlemen.

Candidates as delegates to the constitutional convention: W. W. Alderson and C. H. Cobb of Bozeman, Hon. Caldwell Edwards of Elk creek, F. D. Pease of Livingston, Geo. O. Eaton of Cooke City.

Delegates to the district convention, E. M. Gardiner, C. H. Cobb and Matthew W. Alderson of Bozeman, and F. D. Pease of Livingston.

Quite an interest was manifested in the matter of securing an efficient, acceptable and non-partisan constitution to present to congress at its next session, and while free interchanges of opinion was indulged in, the above suggestions were unanimously approved, and the convention transacted all the business brought before it in an exceedingly harmonious manner.

Votes of thanks were unanimously tendered Mayor J. V. Bogert, chairman, and E. M. Gardiner, secretary of the convention, for the efficient and impartial manner in which they discharged their duties on the occasion; and in his modest acknowledgements, the former took occasion to refer to the growing prosperity of Bozeman and Livingston as well as the good fellowship existing between their citizens, which sentiments were fully and properly responded to by A. B. Curry, chairman of the Livingston delegation, in behalf of the town and citizens of Livingston. The remarks of both gentlemen were heartily applauded.

Dismissed.

The dispatches say that Lieut-Col. Guido Ilges has been dismissed from the army. The sentence to that effect passed by the judge advocate of the court-martial which tried him at St. Paul, has been approved by the president, and Ilges is cashiered. Col. Ilges belonged to the Eighteenth infantry, stationed at Fort Assinaboine, and has always been a thoroughly efficient officer at a post where the protection of the northern frontiers from the Canadian Indians required arduous service and involved more responsibility than in these times devolves upon the average army officer. He was also very popular both in military and private circles in Montana, and the news of his dismissal will occasion universal regret. His offence was that of duplicating his pay accounts and occurred, unfortunately, at a time when there seemed an epidemic of that kind of work among army officers.

Railroad Taxes.

The tax list of Gallatin county shows that the Northern Pacific will be billed for \$13,721.21 taxes. The main line extends 133 miles through the county and is taxed \$8,585.88. The Park branch, all of which is within Gallatin county, is fifty-one miles long, and being assessed at \$4,000 per mile on the road bed, is taxed at \$3,523. The next question is whether this amount will be paid by the rail-company without suit.

The Wyoming Road to the Park.

Mr. Boutwell, the chief promoter of the railroad now being surveyed through Wyoming to the National Park is a brother-in-law of Vanderbilt, but says that his road is entirely independent of any other concern, and will be built by a syndicate of capitalists who control large interests in stock, soda deposits and petroleum lands along the proposed route. The line will start at some point on the Union Pacific between Cheyenne and Rawlins, and will be about 250 miles long. It is expected that 150 miles of the road will be built next summer. The surveyors were last heard of about 75 miles west of Washakie, and reported an easy route as far as they had gone.

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

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
