

**NEWS NOTES.**

There is excellent sleighing in Winnipeg.

Four men have been arrested at Scranton, Pa., for passing counterfeit money.

Alfred White, of Madison, Ind., in jail as a horse thief, suicided by the use of poison.

The Spanish ambassador to France has tendered his resignation and insists on its immediate acceptance.

It is said Sergeant Mason, sentenced to seven years of prison life for shooting at Guiteau, will be pardoned out.

Two criminals flying from the police were killed at Scranton, Pa., in attempting to board a flying express train.

Lewis Woods, a negro, was under a life sentence in Louisiana for rape. The mob would not have it that way and lynched him.

Two daughters of the mikado or emperor of Japan died within forty-eight hours of each other. Of ten children only one survives.

Procter Knott is said to be compiling a number of volumes which will embody the world's wit and humor from the time of Chaucer till now.

The Mexican government has borrowed \$10,000,000 of American and German capitalists. The bonds are sold at 85 per cent. and bear 9 per cent. interest.

Major John J. Coppinger, (promoted to Lieutenant Colonel), who will succeed Col. Ilges in command at Fort Assinaboine, is a son-in-law of James G. Blaine.

Near Livingston, Ark., Sanders Blount, constable, in attempting to arrest Wyatt Ames, (colored) was shot dead. A posse is pursuing Ames, and lynching is probable.

In the Catholic congress at Naples a letter from a Roman duke was read, declaring that the Catholics in Italy were ready to strike for the restitution of the temporal power of the pope.

Mamie Gordon, of Trenton, N. J., aged 14 years, being reprimanded at school for circulating improper ballads and told that her parents would be informed of the act, drowned herself.

Major Rogers, in charge of the Canadian Pacific survey through the Rocky mountains has discovered a direct line for the road by which the distance from Winnipeg to Port Moody will be only 1,480 miles.

The British steamer Ottoman, caught poaching seals off Behring Island, was seized by Russian officers and her furs confiscated for the benefit of the Alaska Commercial company. The vessel was detained and the captain, crew and passengers held as prisoners.

The report that General Hancock is to be transferred to Chicago is contradicted. He will remain in command of the Department of the Atlantic, with headquarters at New York. Brigadier General McKenzie will succeed General Augur in command of the Department of Texas.

Ira C. Bellows, late of Mandan and a brother of the mayor of that town, who while employed in the water register's bureau in New York is alleged to have defrauded the city out of various sums, and who went to New York and gave bail upon the first charge, has been again arrested upon two new indictments, charging embezzlement and grand larceny. He gave bail upon both indictments.

**A Milk Saloon.**

Every table, every counter, every piece of statuary was of white marble. The floors, walls, ceiling, curtains, everything was white.
