

NEWS NOTES.

Commodore Kitson paid \$25,000 for the pacer Placer Johnson.

The Ohioans polled a majority of nearly 70,000 against prohibition.

The possibility of war between France and Spain has caused an advance in ocean freights.

The Northern Pacific refuses to enter into special contracts for the transportation of transcontinental freight.

Col. Lamborn says smelting furnaces are to be built at Duluth to handle Montana, Idaho and Lake Superior ores.

At a meeting of the Grand Army of the Republic at Salt Lake on the 9th inst., the posts in Montana, Utah and Idaho were formed into a department to be known as the department of Utah.

It is stated that J. Wesley Filbert, the absconding Northern Pacific railroad telegraph operator, who was at Townsend this summer, is now in California, and making lots of money speculating in stocks.

There is a report that the Utah and Northern has purchased the franchise and right of way from the Virginia City and Park railway and will make a preliminary survey this fall, to be followed by active operations in the spring.

A strong shock of an earthquake was felt on Monday at Chios, in the Mediterranean. Several houses were destroyed and some persons injured. The shock was felt at Syria and Samaria, and much damage and loss of life are reported at Auroli.

Judge Shipman, of Coldwater, Mich. who with his wife was in Livingston a few weeks ago, has written a letter to Gov. Ordway, expressing his detailed opinion that Judge Edgerton's decision is "way off wrong." Figuratively speaking he pats Uncle Nehemiah on the back and tells him he has acted according to the law.

A considerable number of Chinamen are being landed at San Francisco bearing certificates from the Chinese government that they are traders and not laborers. The greater part of them are in fact laborers, but by a provision of the restriction act, these certificates cannot be disregarded.

Three thousand Irish-Americans met in mass meeting in Chicago a few nights ago and by resolutions demanded that O'Donnell, now on trial in London for killing the informer Carey, have a fair trial and stated that because he is a citizen and ex-soldier of the United States, it is the duty of this government to demand of England that such a trial be granted him.

Joe Leighton and family, of Miles City, will spend the winter in Texas and Mexico.

The body of Godfrey, the young man who was drowned at the upper ferry, has just been found a short distance below the mouth of the Marias.

L. E. Manning, of Butte, was adjudged entitled to \$400 damages, by the Butte court, for certain slanderous things said of him by J. D. Thomas, a prominent merchant.

The democratic candidates for election to the constitutional convention from Lewis and Clarke counties are J. K. Toole, Matthew Carroll, A. M. Woolfolk and T. J. Lowry.

In treating with the Marquis de Mores, the citizens of Billings demand complete security that he will carry out his share of the agreement. One report says he has about abandoned his intention of erecting the works.

Theodore Bach, of Dearborn, was visiting Helena and staying in a cabin with a man named Hardy. One night he attacked Hardy with an axe and inflicted wounds which will probably cause death. Bach gave himself up to the officers and says Hardy struck him first, which the latter denies.

Col. Clough, counsel for the Northern Pacific, speaking yesterday of the filing of liens at Bozeman by workmen formerly employed by the Northern Pacific, said that he thought this was simply another one of the many moves made by Wall street operators to affect the stock market. While he admitted that the liens may have been filed, he said there was no law in Montana to sustain them. The colonel stated, in addition to this, that he found upon inquiry that contractors of the divisions mentioned in the Bozeman telegrams had all been fully paid—Pioneer Press.
