Among the present visitors in Livingston is Thos. F. Coryell, an old-timer in the territory and a mine operator of many years experience. He has just come from the Nelhart or Montana district, which is attracting attention. He says there are lodes in that district that contain plenty of wealth, but from the fact that the ore is very refractory, very few of them can be worked at even a small profit. S. S. Hauser of Helena, has bonded

several claims and will probably develop them. There are very few men in the camp at present—not more than fifteen or twenty—and the outlook is a little dull at present. Since he has been in Livingston he has received such reports of the Emigrant Gulch and Mill Creek districts, as will lead him to visit and inspect them, and we hope his inspection will lead to some good result.

The Pacific Pool Broken.

At the recent conference of Pacific roads the Northern Pacific was urged to unite with the Union and Central in continuing the special contract system, under which Pacific coast business has been done for some time past. According to this system each merchant, in order to obtain the benefit of a rebate, pledged himself to ship all through freight by all rail lines, thus debarring himself the privilege of clipping competition via Cape Horn. The Northern Pacific objected, but finally agreed to defer decision for fifteen days. It has now given final notice to the Transcontinental association that it will not be a party to the system, recognizing the fact that there are some classes of freight which will go by way of Cape Horn instead of across the continent, and does not consider the special contract system can ever be arranged to prevent it. This conclusion on the part of the Northern Pacific will have the effect of breaking upon the conference of San Francisco. It was the intention when this meeting was called to form a Pacific pool, and strong efforts were made in that direction. No unanimous action could be reached because of, as was stated at the time, the jealousy existing between the Central Pacific and Northern Pacific. The arrangement that was finally concluded was a traffic agreement similar to that of the Northwestern Traffic association, each road being allowed to compete for all the business it could, at agreed rates, and with heavy penalties for violations of the rates, or the terms of the agreement. This indecision on the part of the Northern Pacific as regards the special contract system is said to have been the reason why J. C. Gault had not accepted the commissioner-ship.
