The news that A. B. Curry has declined to accept the nomination tendered him by the republican district convention will be received with universal regret throughout the district. From his strong sense of public duty, entire lack of partisan bias and marked general ability he is peculiarly fitted to assist in framing a constitution for the future state of Montana. But for reasons stated in the letter laid before our readers, he has felt it incumbent upon him to decline the honor, highly as he must naturally esteem it. Doubtless it was not put aside lightly, but only after careful consideration had presented the impossibility of acceptance. Livingston will especially regret the turns affairs have taken as it is extremely doubtful if the vacant place on the ticket will be filled from this town and in that event unless the Democratic delegate at large be selected from here (an improbable contingent we fear) only one of our citizens will represent at the constitutional convention, viz: R. W. Hanson or F. D. Pease.

We learn that a mooted project in the Barker mining district is to remove the smelters now located there to some point away from the mines, easy of access and abundantly supplied with water, etc., and to induce all other mine operators intending to erect smelters in that or neighboring districts to build them at the same place. Great Falls, on the Missouri, is one of the places under discussion with that view as possessing all the advantages necessary. Anaconda, on Warm Springs creek, in Deer Lodge county, is a camp that has grown up around a mammoth smelter which is being built to handle the ore taken from the Anaconda mine, in Butte, thirty miles away; and the advisability of removing all the reduction works from Butte to Anaconda or a similar location has been seriously considered. We mention these facts to show our Livingston readers that reduction works at this point are something that are not only liable to be built here, but certain to come, and within a short time, if the mineral regions hereabout develop according to universal expectation. Experience in the operation of mines has proven that the most eligible location for a smelter is not always at the mine nor in the mining district whence the ore is taken.

Villard's Thanks.

President Villard of the Northern Pacific, has issued and caused to be posted in all depots and stations along the road a card of thanks to all friends of the Northern Pacific in Minnesota, Dakota, Montana, Washington and Oregon as follows:




