The excitement at Lisbon, Dak., over the alleged discovery of gold near that town is subsiding. The dispatches from there are careful to say that the discoveries are no farce, but that it is a question whether the metal exists in sufficient quantities to pay. We still maintain that the announcement is a deep scheme to sell real estate.

An injunction has been obtained in New York forbidding the Northern Pacific company from issuing the \$20,000,000 of second mortgage bonds. The ground is that under the act of its incorporation the company cannot issue these bonds without the consent of congress. A motion to dissolve the injunction will be heard November 1st.

The visit of the gentleman mentioned in our local columns, who seeks to be proprietor of a hotel in Livingston, again impresses us with the importance of this question. But his journey here from so far away with this sole end in view is no solution of the question. It would, we presume, be an easy matter to obtain a good proprietor for such a hotel. What Livingston needs is the capital to invest in the enterprise. In the work of buying needed lots, erecting upon them necessary buildings and stocking them with goods the capital of our infant city has been largely invested so that, though for so young a place as this, there is represented a great amount of wealth, its profits are being constantly expended in making necessary improvements on individual property. The Northern Pacific land department offers to give the necessary ground to any person or company that will expend in erecting and furnishing a hotel in Livingston the sum of fifty thousand dollars. That sum is beyond present local ability. There is no person or firm of persons in the town who have fifty thousand dollars to spare from their own business for any investment; and the erection of a hotel at that amount actual expenditure is not a very popular scheme upon which to engage the attention of a stock company. But will nothing but a \$50,000 hotel fulfill our present requirements? We conceive that an institution of the kind costing even half that money would be a great advance on anything in Montana, and while the active aid and encouragement of the railroad authorities is of great importance it is not strictly indispensable. This prospect of sometime having a hotel that will cost fifty or a hundred thousand dollars is a parallel case with that of the starving man who is promised an abundance of delicate food but meantime suffers for lack of a crust of bread. Thousands of dollars that would otherwise have been spent here in Livingston have already gone past the town because our present hotels will not accommodate the class of visitors who flock here during the summer months. We look upon it as imperative that a hotel of a class far in advance of those now here be erected before the beginning of another summer, and we should be contented with one that would cost considerably less than \$50,000, though as a fact, the class and amount of travel that comes here actually demands better and greater hotel accommodations at this point than at any between the two termini of the line of road. That it would pay goes without saying. It could not be otherwise than a highly profitable investment, if operated in accordance with business principle. What shall be done to induce the investment?

The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company, to which Helena's telephone exchange belongs, has acquired the sole right to the territories of Utah, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho, and has eleven exchanges and over 1,000 instruments in successful operation. The capital stock of the company is \$800,000, divided into 800 shares of \$100 each. It will pay good dividends.


