**MONTANA NEWS.**

The Northern Pacific is building a hotel and eating house at Heron Sid-ing.

Citizens of Miles who hail from "down east," have organized a New England society.

A Glendale clergyman has a magic lantern with Yellowstone Park views, and is giving exhibitions for the benefit of the church.

Yesterday morning three buildings belonging to Walter Matheson, on 26th street, in Billings, were burned. Loss, \$3,000; insurance, \$1,500.

C. Haggood, of Red Bluff, owner of the valuable mine known as the New York Belle, is about to dispose of it to eastern parties at a handsome figure.

Negotiations are afoot for the sale of the Helena Independent to a gentleman named Potts, of Ohio, a brother of ex-Gov. Potts, and a newspaper man of experience.

A Butte doctor sued a citizen for fees incurred in treatment for an un-mentionable disease. Defendant proved that he was not so afflicted and obtained judgment in his favor.

The twenty houses and ten saloons at Hays City, Coeur d'Alene district, are a myth. The population consists of a few miners, who expect to winter there, and a patient mule, which is hired at \$15 per day for all purposes of transportation.

A number of men at Benton and vicinity are seriously intending the invasion of the great Blackfoot reservation for the purpose of settling upon inviting ranches, and prospecting for precious metals in the Bear Paw and Little Rocky mountains.

The land sales of the Northern Pacific for the year ending November 30 aggregated 954,422.01 acres, for which \$2,849,491.13 was received. The sales were divided as follows: Minnesota district, 17,211.68 acres; Dakota district, 548,969.02 acres; Montana district 65,451.04 acres; Washington district 223,777.28 acres.

The Butte Miner tells of a Jefferson county ranchman who married a young lady of such an enterprising turn of mind that she presented him with a baby the next day and the day following the child died. A marriage, a birth and a death in a small family in three days is a rare record.

A correspondent of the River Press gives a graphic description of the sudden break up in the Teton and Marias rivers when the warm weather came. Where ten minutes before men and teams had been crossing on the ice in safety, was suddenly transformed into a raging torrent of driving ice and foaming water.

To the many crazy gold-hunters who are bound to go into the Coeur d'Alene mines this winter, our paper of this week says in stormy tones of hardship there is no trail to the mines at present, except by snow-shoes, and the man who undertakes to go in there must pack in his own provisions. About fifty men left there on the 26th, and many others are following them,—Missoulian.

The amount due from the county commissioners to Sheriff Ferguson, of Yellowstone county, has been attached by H. G. Harrison & Co., of Minneapolis, to secure payment of a disputed account growing out of Ferguson's past mercantile transactions. The sheriff has sold his interest in the bills and received payment for the same, and the commissioners are perplexed regarding the course they should pursue.

Gov. Crosby recommends to congress, through the secretary of the Interior, the immediate cutting down of all Indian reservations, now covering two-fifths of the area of Montana, to the actual wants of the 18,000 Indians, throwing the lands open for settlement. He urges relief for the Blackfeet, North Piegiens, Assinaboines, Gros Ventres, and also that schools for educating Indians in agricultural pursuits be established.

The Bismarck Capital publishes a list of two hundred and seventeen buildings erected in Bismarck during the past summer, and estimates their value at \$254,910. If placed in a line the Capital estimates they would present a frontage of over one mile.


