Frank R. Carmen, a San Francisco clerk, committed suicide.

Allan Pinkerton is at the point of death in Chicago.

At Tigerville, La., a sugar warehouse was destroyed by a cyclone.

At Whitney, Texas, Ike Laddy, a colored rapist of white women, was lynched.

The wheat crop throughout the country is reported to prospect equal to last year's yield.

At Vincennes, Ind., Oliver Canfield, who murdered Mrs. Mollie Ghikin, was lynched.

The Louisiana legislature has appropriated \$100,000 in aid of the New Orleans exposition.

A derrick used for raising stone at Grace church, New York, fell, fatally injuring two workmen.

Joseph Johnson, of Wilmington, Del., President of the Newark Brick company, absconded with \$50,000.

The Missouri democratic delegation will be solid for Cleveland if Tilden will not accept the nomination.

Dr. Vaile, of England, an eminent physician and heir to an immense fortune, is missing. Foul play is suspected.

All roads leading into Chicago will carry those attending the democratic convention at half fare for the round trip.

A break in a levee at Union island near Stockton, Cal., destroyed 7,000 acres of wheat beside damaging other property.

The bill to authorize the appointment of two additional judges for Dakota and one for Washington, has passed both houses of congress.

A natural gas well has been struck at Pittsburgh, Pa. Its use by the coal company that owns it will save 40,000 bushels of coal per month.

The Mexican pension bill has passed the senate. An amendment to it excludes from its provisions those who are drawing pensions by reason of the late war of the rebellion.

The Independent republican committee of New York, headed by Carl Schurz, will address a circular to republicans throughout the country setting forth reasons why they should not vote for Blaine and Logan.

The house committee on public lands will report favorably the bill forfeiting such portions of lands granted to the Southern Pacific railroad company, California, as lie along that part of the road completed since July, 1878. About 5,000,000 acres are involved.

George Pomeroy Keese, in Harper's Magazine: The great reservoir from which has been drawn the bulk of the cattle which are now becoming so abundant in all our western territories is the state of Texas. In 1870 one-seventh of the horned cattle in the United States was found within its borders, and it outnumbered the aggregate of those of all the other states and territories west of the Missouri, California and the Pacific coast included. This ratio was slightly changed by the statistics of 1880, the state representing somewhat less than one-eighth of the whole number, while it still contained more than all the others mentioned above. From this source of supply has been drawn the great bulk of the range cattle now to be found on the public lands east of the Rocky Mountains, an industry which has grown to huge proportions, and dating back in the states and territories a few years only. As an evidence of this we note that in 1870 the number given in Montana, Wyoming, and Colorado was a little less than 280,000. Ten years later Wyoming alone equalled this, while the three together aggregated nearly 900,000. We do not doubt that accurate census taken to-day would more than double these figures. To Texas, then, we must still look for the supply from which to draw recruits to further develop the capabilities of the northern ranges. Like the tide of emigration which is daily landing thousands of foreigners on the shores of the New World, more than equalling the relative birth in crease, so the annual cattle-drive from Texas must yet be the base of supplies for all the country north.
