### COUNTERFEITERS IN TOWN

An Unpretentious Old Woman Who Passes Bad Coins.

THERE ARE MANY VICTIMS

Extensive Operations on the Street Car Lines—New-Looking Quarters Should Be Carefully Inspected. The Woman Was Captured, But Mr. Babendrier Set Her Free.

A little, unpretentious old woman, perhaps fifty or fifty-five years of age, dressed in a plain black dress, got on a Metropolitan electric car at the Sixth street depot Thursday evening and tendered the conductor a bright, shining quarter, with a request for change instead of tickets. She was accommodated and after riding several blocks up Ninth street she alighted and took the next car back to the depot, again tendering the conductor a new 25-cent piece and getting no change in change. She repeated this operation a number of times, riding until midnight, so that some of the conductors carried the woman several times. In each instance she paid her fare with a coin apparently fresh from the mint, and always asked for change instead of tickets.

The railroad men soon sized up the mysterious female as being what is known as a "spotter," and each thought she was trying to detect some conductor in the act of "knocking down" fares. Their mistake was discovered yesterday morning, when Night Superintendent William Deneal, in counting over the cash which the men had turned in with their reports, found more than twenty counterfeit quarters. So good was the imitation that it was with some difficulty that they were detected, and not one of the victims had suspected that the coins were counterfeit.

The Secret Service office was notified of the operations of the "spotter," and Chief Hazen, upon investigating the matter, directed the superintendent of the Ninth street line to instruct his men that in case the woman was seen again to detain and turn her over to an officer. Yesterday afternoon the woman again began operations. At the Sixth street depot she again boarded car No. 23, going south, and tendered Conductor James Horne one of the bogus coins. Horne was on the look-out for the woman, and did a clever piece of detective work. He gave her twenty cents in change and then directed the motorman to run to the power house without stopping.

When the woman wanted to get off she was told that the train was a through one, and upon reaching the office she was turned over to Supt. E. O. Babendrier, the man who was robbed of \$1,600 in the Yacht luncheon several weeks ago. Instead of complying with the order of Chief Hazen and turning the woman over to an officer, Mr. Babendrier released her, after asking her name and address, which she failed to give him.

Upon leaving the office of the company she was seen to board a north-bound car, but she did not go alone. Conductor Pete Eicher, of train No. 22, who had lost a dollar through the woman, was off duty and followed her.

Three cars behind Superintendent Babendrier followed in an attempt to overtake her. He was fortunate enough to pass her as she was standing at Seventh and B streets, waiting for a Capital Traction train. Mr. Babendrier called to Conductor Ready to watch the woman. Conductor Eicher had her spotted at the same time, and together the two men traced her to the Seventh and G streets where she alighted and took the next car back and transferred at the Avenue, and rode as far as Third street, where she disappeared in a luncheon.

The Late W. Hallen Phillips' Will Filed for Probate.

The will of W. Hallen Phillips, who was drowned last Sunday, was filed for probate yesterday. The instrument is originally dated February 2, 1889, with codicils dated October 29, 1889; July 23, 1890, and April 8, 1892.

In the original will P. Lee Phillips, a brother, got the entire estate, and was named as executor. To Thomas Lee, a personal friend, the entire collection of Indian curiosities is bequeathed, with the wish that at some future time they reach the Smithsonian Institution. Charles Phillips Hill receives a gold watch, a family heirloom, and George Kennan and Archibald Rogers, of New York, receive small articles as keepsakes.
