Poor Circumstances of the Woman Injured at Thursday's Fire.

Mrs. Lilla Crab, of No. 1227 Alford street northeast, the unfortunate woman who was so seriously injured on Thursday while endeavoring to rescue a neighbor, was doing as well as could be expected yesterday.

Mrs. Crab is the mother of four small children, one being in the hospital. Her husband had only lately secured employment, and they are in very poor circumstances. The accident has rendered it necessary for Mr. Crab to give up his position and remain at home to care for his little ones and minister to the wants of the unfortunate wife.

The neighbors of the sick woman, like herself, are nearly all very poor, but are doing all in their power to alleviate her distress.

Mrs. M. F. Lithgow, an employee of the Treasury Department, and a resident of the northeast, has interested herself in the matter, and yesterday succeeded in raising a small sum among the clerks of

her division for the benefit of Mrs. Crab. Mr. Crab will today probably apply to Secretary Wilson of the Associated Charities, for aid and also to the Methodist Training School for a nurse for his wife.
