

AS TO HAWAII AND CUBA

Foreign Relations Committee Discuss Many Grave Matters.

SENATOR BERRY'S RESOLUTION

It is Very Possible That It Will Be Favorably Reported to the Senate on Wednesday—Senator Morgan Does Not Fear Japanese Interference With Hawaii.

The Foreign Relations Committee held two meetings yesterday, in the morning and afternoon, and although it was not agreed to report any matter to the Senate, three matters of the gravest importance were discussed.

The three matters discussed were the Hawaiian treaty, the Morgan bill for permanent introduction of Mr. Berry's resolution, and the resolution for the introduction of the Berry resolution.

Mr. Morgan was asked what effect the recent news from Hawaii about Japanese interference would have on the course of legislation in the annexation interest there.

Mr. Morgan was asked if he believed there would be action on the Berry resolution at this session.

That depends, he said, on whether the President desires action. It is evident that if he wants action he can have it.

Senator Freese, who brought up the Hawaiian treaty in the first Republican caucus, said that it would not be passed upon this session.
