

LOST HIS ROLL OF MONEY

Mr. Alfred Giddings Drops \$221 in the District Building.

It Quickly Disappears and the Loser Is Hoping for an Honest Finder—Willing to Divide.

A roll of bills containing \$221 was lost by Mr. Alfred W. Giddings, of No. 1029 Seventh street northeast, while in the District building yesterday afternoon.

The gentleman had gone into the water office to pay his water rent, and was accompanied by his friend and neighbor, Mr. W. N. Morrison. When the amount of Mr. Giddings' bill was made known to him he took from his pocket a roll of money containing \$225, and taking from it a \$5 bill, he paid the amount and received \$1 in change and a receipt. Mr. Giddings rolled the receipt and \$1 around the bills and put them back in his pocket, or rather he thought he did, but now he thinks they fell on the floor.

Mr. Morrison paid his bill also, and the two gentlemen started across the street to the office of the recorder of deeds, Mr. Giddings wishing to have some deeds of property recorded. When the two reached the middle of the street Mr. Giddings put his hand in his pocket and discovered that his money was gone. Without a word he hurried back into the water office, but failed to find any trace of it. Mr. Morrison assisted him in his search, but the only information they could gather was that the colored janitor had seen some one pick up something off the floor, but supposing it was something dropped by himself, no attention was paid to it.

Mr. Giddings reported his loss to the detective department, but to a Times man he said last night:

"I confess that I have no hope of getting my money. I am almost positive I dropped it on the floor in the water office instead of putting it in my pocket, as I thought I did. If an honest man found it I will get it, but in this hope I am taking big chances. I offer to give the finder one-half, and if it is returned I will just consider that I am \$110.50 in. While the loss is a heavy one to me, I simply charge it to my carelessness. It was not in a pocket-book, as I never carry one. I hope the man who got it, and if he keeps it, needs it worse than I do. I am satisfied I was not robbed."
