LINKING PAST AND PRESENT Sixteen Living Mementoes of the Revolutionary War.

IN THE PENSION BUREAU Seven Widows and Nine Daughters of Revolutionary Soldiers on the Roll—Children Provided for by Act of Congress—Twelve Dollars a Month to the Aged Dames.

There remain now on the Pension Bureau records only sixteen living links between the days of the Revolution and the present. All of these links are women, seven widows and nine daughters.

The ages of three are advancing. Those of the rest range from seventy-six, the lady of the group, to ninety-seven, which tell the years of the eldest two.

The husbands of these seven widows and the fathers of these nine daughters were of that gallant army which triumphed over great odds that freedom might live.

The law allows a pension to every widow of a soldier of the revolution. There is no law, however, which gives pensions to the children or heirs of those soldiers.

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OTHELLO KIRALY IS DEAD SHE BLEW HER BRAINS OUT

The German Actress Masqueraded as Mrs. Olga King.

The Cast-Off Wife of an Austrian Captain Finds Paraphernalia in New York and Brooklyn—Her Last Italian Merchant—Deserted by Him, She Dies.

New York, Aug. 24.—Mrs. Olga Kiraly, a handsome brunette, who had occupied a flat on the third floor of the apartment house at 174 Union street, Brooklyn, for the past year, was found dead in her bedroom at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The police at first thought that the case was one of suicide. They sought in vain a man who is known to the neighbors as "Mr. King," and had about given up when Mr. King surrendered himself.

It developed that Mrs. Kiraly was a flightless name, and that the woman was in reality a one-time famous German actress, known as Othello Kiraly, and that she came to this country when cast off by her husband, Lieut. Col. Emil Kiraly, who was an officer in the Thirtieth Austrian Infantry.

Mrs. Kiraly's cast-off husband was published far and wide, and when she did not modify her conduct in any marked degree, she was about thirty years old and very pretty.

Placido Satta, an Italian, in the produce business on State street, this city, resides at 159 President street, Brooklyn, a few blocks from Mrs. Kiraly's flat.

He said that he had seen Mrs. Kiraly at the rear window of her flat and belonged to him. It was 7:30, he said, when he entered Mrs. Kiraly's bedroom. She asked him if all was to be expected of her.

As Othello Kiraly, Mrs. Kiraly was an actress in Austria and Germany ten years ago. While in Budapest she met Col. Von Satta, a member of a wealthy and prominent family, and a man high up in the military service.

SENORITA CISNEROS' PRISON. Horrible Place in Which the Young Cuban Girl Is Confined.

Capt. Gen. Weyler has for a year compelled Miss Cisneros to sleep in a filthy cell with outcast negroes and the vilest white women of the slums of Havana.

The Casa de Remedios, or prison for abandoned women, in Havana, in which Senorita Cisneros is imprisoned, is one of the most abominable jails in Cuba.

Last winter, when these two women were in the Casa de Remedios, there were twenty-two prisoners in all there. Twenty were women and two men.

LUETGERT'S FIGHT FOR LIFE Chicago Sausage-Maker on Trial for Wife Murder.

Chicago, Aug. 24.—One of the sensations which the State expects to spring in the Lucretia wife murder case, now on hearing in the criminal court, will be the testimony of Prof. Walton S. Haines, of Rush Medical College.
