CHRISTEN THE KENTUCKY

Miss Richardson Angry Over Gov. Bradley's Action.

HIS DAUGHTER AS SPONSOR

Declines the Governor's Daughter Received the Honor Because His Staff Officers Worked Up a Boon—Terminates That Secretary Herbert Named Her for Sponsor.

Lexington, Ky., Dec. 2.—Miss Harriet B. Richardson, who was selected by ex-Secretary Herbert to christen the new battleship Kentucky, is more angry than ever tonight since it has been announced that Governor Bradley received a letter from Secretary Long, dated November 20, asking him to appoint a sponsor for the new battleship named after his State.

It seems that Miss Richardson has been doing some quiet detective work. She says she has found that the alleged spontaneous petition from the Commercial Club, of Louisville, and the president of that club, Miss Richardson said tonight: "The honor of christening the new battleship came to me absolutely unthought. I was present at a dinner party in Washington, given at the Sherman by the night secretary Herbert, and he named the new ship after his State."

"The newspapers got hold of it and from all over the country I received congratulations on my selection. These facts were known to all Kentuckians, and they would certainly have known it if they had been made any effort to call Secretary Long's attention to my previous appointment."

"I understand that immediately after the receipt of the letter from Secretary Long, Gov. Bradley showed his friends to go to work and manufacture the supposed public sentiment in favor of his naming his own daughter for the position which had been tendered me and accepted by me."

"The petitions were prepared by a typewriter in the office of a member of Gov. Bradley's staff here, and were sent out to Gov. Bradley's close friends all over the State, who were instructed how to proceed. Then it was placed in the newspapers that the unanimous sentiment of Kentuckians was in favor of Gov. Bradley appointing his own daughter as sponsor."

"President Cox of the chamber of commerce said tonight: 'I thought Miss Richardson had been selected as sponsor, and I hesitated about signing my petition until I was informed by Mr. Sperry that she had not been appointed, that the story of her appointment was simply a talk. I then signed the petition as president of the Lexington chamber of commerce.'"

Gov. Bradley declined to be interviewed about the matter, but gave out the following letter, which he received two weeks ago, which, he thinks, justifies his action:
