WESTERN HIGH SCHOOL. The New Building Will Be Dedicated This Evening.

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IN THE CLASSIFIED SERVICE.

No Immediate Change as to Deputy Collectors under Examination.

It was stated at the White House yesterday that there is no truth in the report that President McKinley contemplates issuing before Thanksgiving Day a proclamation exempting from the classified service some 2,000 deputy collectors of internal revenue and some 4,000 medical examiners of the pension bureau.

It has been known for some months that the President contemplated issuing such an order, but has been prevented by the great pressure of other matters from giving it even a passing consideration.

Papers and recommendations in the matter were long ago placed in the President's hands by Secretaries Gage and Bliss, but as yet they have not been called for by President McKinley.

Neither Commissioner of Internal Revenue Scott nor Commissioner of Pensions Evans has any idea or intimation that the order is soon to be issued, although both expect it at a later date.

Deputy Commissioner of Internal Revenue Wilson said yesterday morning to a Times reporter that the question of exempting the deputy collectors throughout the country from the classified list was an old one.

It has long been known that a change was contemplated in the classification of the medical examiners of the Pension Bureau. There are over 4,000 of these officials, all of whom were covered into the civil service by the blanket order of President Cleveland.

Will of William R. Keyworth. The will of William Robert Keyworth, dated April 28 last, was filed yesterday. The deceased bequeaths all his property, real and mixed, to his wife, Lucretia Cecilia Keyworth, whom he names as sole executrix.
