**BOSS QUAY ON TRIAL FOR CONSPIRACY**

**The Accused Early on Hand, Smiling and Confident.**

No Quibbling by Attorneys and a Jury Quickly Obtained.

Thomas W. Barlow, Receiver of the People's Bank, on the Witness Stand at Adjournment.

Philadelphia, April 10.—The trial of former United States Senator Matthew Quay and his son, Richard R. Quay, on charges of conspiracy to use illegally State money and funds of the People's Bank, before Judge Biddle, up to the moment of the beginning of the proceedings there was doubt as to whether or not the trial would go on. The day was the third which had been fixed for the opening of the trial and a repetition of the unexpected something to prevent the trial from going on was anticipated.

The courtroom in which the case was called is on the sixth floor of the City Hall, directly opposite the Broad Street station of the Pennsylvania Railroad. It was in this room that H. H. Holmes was tried and convicted several years ago. The room is large, airy, and handsomely fitted up. Entrance to it was gained with difficulty. Only persons who held slips stating that they were witnesses succeeded in passing the lines of policemen stationed at both ends of the long corridor outside. In order to prevent confusion, spectators, newspaper men, and all others received these "witness" slips so as to have all alike. Naturally the guarded distribution of admission favors brought out a notable assemblage, which included legislators, politicians, and several prominent reformers.

The trialmen were a study. Fifty men made up the panel. Four or five fairly well known citizens were among the laymen, the best known being Talcut Wilcox, of the firm of the "Press" and a noted Egyptologist. The laymen had, unknown to most of them, been subjects of all sorts of enquiry, the prosecution having employed detectives and made careful investigation of the habits of every man drawn for jury duty. The makeup of the jury panel led to the postponement in February, but it was stated this morning that it would not cause a continuance this time. The names of the laymen were drawn from the jury wheel with extraordinary care and the drawing made by the sheriff publicly early in March.

**The Presiding Judge.**

Craig Biddle, President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, No. 1, presided. Judge Biddle is a man of austere countenance and of keen, determined turn of mind. He has been on the bench many years and is regarded as one of the fairest-minded men of the judiciary.

**Postponement Looked For.**

Judge Biddle convened the court a few minutes before 10 o'clock and persons assembled in the courtroom had hardly taken their seats when the defendants and their counsel arrived in a body. A. S. L. Shields led the party into the courtroom and was followed by former Senator Quay, his son, Richard Quay; Senator Peacock; Attorney John Devine; Mr. Shields' assistant, Rufus E. Shapley, senior counsel for the defense; the assistant district attorney, Mr. Shapley, junior counsel for the prosecution; and the well-known Pittsburgh lawyer, David Watson.

**THE DEAD JURIST HONORED.**

Arrangements for the funeral of the late Stephen J. Field.

The funeral of the late Justice Stephen J. Field will be held in the Church of the Epiphany Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The services will be conducted by Bishop Satterlee and Rev. Dr. McKim, pastor of the church.

The funeral, while simple in ceremony, will be one of the most impressive in Washington in recent years. President McKinley and the members of his Cabinet, the Justices of the United States Supreme Court and District Judges, and other distinguished persons in Washington and from other cities will attend. The remains will be placed temporarily in a private vault in Oak Hill.
