A board of officers will be convened at the Marine Hospital Service Building in New York, Wednesday, October 4, for the purpose of examining candidates for admission to the grade of assistant surgeon in the United States Marine Hospital Service. Candidates must be between twenty-one and thirty years of age, graduates of a respectable medical college, and must furnish testimonials from responsible persons as to character. Successful candidates will be numbered according to their attainments to duty at one of the large marine hospitals, as at Boston, New York, New Orleans, Cape, San Francisco, etc. After five years' service as assistant surgeons are entitled to examinations for promotion to the grade of paid assistant surgeon. Promotion to the grade of surgeon is made according to seniority.
