AN ATTEMPTED SUICIDE. Policeman Birkenmeyer Shoots Himself in the Head. Despondency Over a Postponed Marriage Assigned as the Cause for the Act—His Fiancée Too Ill to Go Through With the Ceremony—Little Hope of the Man's Recovery.

Joseph K. Birkenmeyer, a policeman, attached to the Second precinct, attempted suicide by shooting himself in the left temple shortly after 8 o'clock yesterday morning, at 907 Eleventh Street northwest, where he boarded with Mrs. Koch. Birkenmeyer was engaged to the daughter of Mrs. Koch, and they were engaged to be married. Owing to ill health Miss Koch had postponed the marriage from time to time, whereas Birkenmeyer became despondent and moody, and often threatened to take his life.
