IN AND ABOUT THE CITY.

Sudden Death of a Colored Woman. Mary Johnson, colored, is reported to have died suddenly yesterday afternoon about 1 o'clock at her home, 1213 Third Street southeast. No physician was present. Word was sent to Coroner Nevitt, who will view the remains this morning. Death is thought to have resulted from natural causes.

Fight in Willow Tree Alley. William Carter, alias Peaty, fought last night with William Mitchell, in Willow Tree Alley southeast. The police were called by persons in the vicinity of the case. The fight was in the left leg and lost much blood. He was removed to the Homeopathic Hospital in a patrol wagon. Carter made his escape.

A Raid in Fighting Alley. Policemen of the Fourth precinct station went into Fighting Alley southeast last night and raided the house of Lucy Barrett, colored, who was taken into custody. She is charged with keeping an unlicensed bar. Some liquor found in the house was confiscated. The police summoned several persons to appear this morning in the Police Court against the woman.

Charged With Assaulting a Woman. William H. Johnson, colored, thirty years of age, was arrested and placed at the FBI precinct station last night charged with attempted criminal assault upon Alice Pratt, also colored. The woman lives at 116 Francis Street southeast. Saturday night, it is alleged, Johnson went to the house of the woman, forced an entrance, and attacked her. She called for help and Johnson became frightened and escaped. He was arrested later, identified by his alleged victim, and will be arraigned this morning in the Police Court.

An Alleged Unlicensed Bar. Mattie Moore, fifty-five years of age, was taken into custody yesterday by the Sixth precinct police on a charge of keeping an unlicensed bar. Her home is at 303 Missouri Avenue northwest. Sergeant Williams, together with Policemen Langley and Mullen, called at the place and confiscated considerable liquor and beer. In the usual evidence against the accused. Shortly after her arrest the woman became ill, and it was thought best to leave her at home, where she could receive medical attention. Policeman Stevenson was detailed to guard the premises last night.
