### LIVE TOPICS ABOUT TOWN.

"The trade in dairy products between the United States and Porto Rico seems to be one capable of much development," said E. C. Pearson, Assistant Chief of the Dairy Division of the Bureau of Animal Industry at the Agricultural Department, last night. Under the eye of the chief of the bureau, Mr. Pearson is about to make a trip to the island with the special purpose in view of seeing what can be done to develop the market for dairy products there.

"That none of the countries in the Tropics has to any extent taken up dairying. Milk and its products have not, evidently, been thought much of by the native races there, and they have been content to get without the things, such as butter and cheese, which we of the Temperate Zone have come to look upon as necessities. This, I suppose, is the result of the difficulty of obtaining the necessary climate in keeping milk any length of time. The natives in tropical climates are not liable to go to trouble to do so, and, as they have at hand fruits, nuts, and grain, have not found it necessary to raise cattle or to make use of them.

"Now, however, the social conditions have so changed that the inhabitants have come to desire butter, and in consequence a large trade in the article has grown up between the temperate and tropical countries. The trade is not so large as it might be because of the difficulty of delivering such perishable articles in good condition. That is the problem which we are trying to solve. For many years butter has been sent to Porto Rico in a strong article, in strong cardboard boxes covered with a coating of paraffin, which makes the packages almost airtight. It is later in the month of transportation, we can, I think, build up a large business in the island. It is possible to estimate the trade now done between the two countries in dairy products, but I do not imagine that as yet it reaches many thousands of dollars.
