

MOROCCO'S QUEER THREAT

To Move the Court to Escape Consul General Gummere.

An Effort of the Sultan to Avoid Reparation for American Claims—The Armored Cruiser New York Sent to Back Up Our Demands.

The American Government has a new cause of resentment against the Government of Morocco. Yesterday instructions were sent by telegram to Mr. Gummere, the United States Consul General at Tangier, to demand an apology for an apparent discourtesy to the United States by the Sultan's Grand Vizier and his Minister of Foreign Affairs.

When one sovereign nation calls on another sovereign nation to apologize, the first nation is expected to resort to arms if the apology is not forthcoming. It is not believed here that the apology will be refused by the Sultan.
