ing States have the right to legislate upon or interfere with slavery in any of the slaveholding States in the Union."

This resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote, and these men knew it.

A committee was appointed to see if further measures of conciliation could not be adopted in order to avert civil war, and Mr. Corwin, a distinguished citizen of Ohio, reported various propositions. All the Territories of the United States were organized on laws passed by Congress, which, I believe, received the unanimous vote of both Houses.

It will hardly be believed that it is upon such arguments as are contained in the extract from the Congressional address the Democracy of the United States are called upon to organize and from annihilation, to save the rights of the citizen.
