The Trouble in Maryland.

The trouble arising out of the proposed removal of the Baltimore police Commissioners, is not yet finally determined.

Under the amended State Constitution of Maryland, "no person who has at any time been in armed hostility to the United States," or "has in any manner adhered to the enemies of the United States," or has declared "his desire for the triumph of said enemies over the arms of the United States, shall ever be entitled to vote at any election to be held in this State, etc."

If the present Commissioners could be removed, and others appointed who would select Judges and Clerks of elections that would permit all the returned Rebels to vote on the 6th of November, it is thought by the Democrats that they could defeat the Union nominees for the Assembly, prevent the ratification of the Amendment to the Federal Constitution, and elect a Johnsonite to the United States Senate in place of Hon. J. J. Cresswell; and as Gov. Swan himself is an aspirant for the place, he has joined heartily with the Rebel sympathizers in their movement against the Commissioners.

On Friday last, the examination of witnesses was commenced, and it is thought a decision will be reached to-day. If, as is apprehended, a removal will then be ordered, it does not necessarily follow that any serious consequences will ensue.

Jack Rogers, of New Jersey, has at last proved too strong a dose even for the better members of his own party. It is claimed that he secured his nomination this fall through a packed Convention, and a new Convention has just been held by those Democrats of his district who do not like that way of doing things.

ALIAS CITATION.

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The Fenian Trials.

The trial of the Fenian invasionists of Canada was commenced on the 25th of Oct. at Toronto, Canada West. Colonel Lynch and Rev. John M'Mahon were the first tried. Both were convicted and sentenced to be hanged on the 13th of December.

REPUBLICAN VICTORY IN WEST VIRGINIA.—The election in West Virginia has been again carried unmistakably for the Union, as maintained by a loyal Congress. The majority is considerably in excess of that on the vote to amend the State Constitution last May.

THE CATHOLICS AND THE BLACK RACE.—At the recent Plenary Council at Baltimore, one of the principal subjects for discussion was the status of the black race in the States, and in the church. It was the uniform opinion of the Southern bishops that here was a very wide field for missionary effort, and that the church would be justified in a liberal expenditure of men and money in gathering the scattering sheep into the Catholic fold.

Riot at Hagerstown, Maryland.

On the 19th of October, the Unconditional Union men of Maryland held a meeting at Hagerstown, which is represented as the largest political assemblage that has ever been held in that place.
