CLEARFIELD CASE.—Isaiah McDonald, of Penn township, in this county, was indicted in the Quarter Sessions of Northumberland county, last week, for "larceny as bailed." John McCracken was the prosecutor. It appears that McDonald was employed to run a raft down the West Branch from Clearfield to Marietta. He ran into temptation and out of funds on the way down, and concluded to sell the raft at Northumberland to Chamberlain, Erick & Co., for which he received the sum of \$683.66, divided with a companion and left. The defence argued that the raft did not belong to McCracken after it had started down the river, but to the purchaser Mr. Henry Swann, and therefore the indictment was wrongly laid with McCracken as prosecutor, but the counsel for the Commonwealth, J. Merrill Linn, and the Court were of the opinion that the property did not rest in Swann until the raft reached its destination. It was part of the contract that it should be delivered, and of course the raft would be the seller's until the contract was fulfilled. The jury at 6 o'clock brought in a verdict of guilty, and Isaiah McDonald was sentenced to two years imprisonment at hard labor in the eastern Penitentiary.

This will be a lesson to jobbers, and learn them that it is a serious business to attempt to sell a raft entrusted to them under a contract to run it to market.
