WALKING AND SLEEPING WITH THE MOUTH OPEN.—There is one rule which should be strictly observed by all in taking exercise by walking, as the very best form in which it can be taken by both the young and the able bodied of all ages, and that is, never to allow the action of respiration or breathing to be carried on through the mouth. The nasal passages are clearly the medium through which respiration was, by our Creator, designed to be carried on. "God breathed into man's nostrils the breath of life," previous to his becoming a living creature.

The difference in the exhaustion of strength by a long walk with the mouth firmly and resolution closed, and respiration carried on through the nostrils instead of through the mouth, cannot be conceived as possible by those who have never tried the experiment. Indeed, this mischievous and really unnatural habit of carrying on the work of inspiration and really unnatural habit of carrying on the work of inspiration and expiration through the mouth instead of through the nasal passages, is the true origin of almost all diseases of the throat and lungs, bronchitis, congestion, asthma, and even consumption itself.

That excessive perspiration to which some individuals are so liable in their sleep, and which is so weakening to the body, is solely the effect of such people sleeping with their mouths open. And the same exhaustive results arise to the animal system with the mouth open, instead of when not engaged in conversation—preserving the lips in a state of firm but quiet compression. Children should never be allowed to sleep, stand or walk with their mouths open; for, besides the vacant appearance it gives to the countenance, it sometimes causes coughs, colds, and sore throats.—Dr. Hall.


