WHY DOES GUNPOWDER DRIVE A BALL FROM A CANNON?—When gunpowder is burned, the elements of which it is composed are changed from the solid to the gaseous form, and, as gases, they occupy some 300 or 400 times more bulk than they do in the solid state at the same temperature. But the same substances, at the same time that they are changed into gases, are intensely heated, and by this means their volume or pressure is still more augmented. Various statements have been made in relation to the amount of pressure produced by the burning of gunpowder, but the best experiments that we have seen any account of were made by some of the officers of our army. Little cylinders, furnished with solid pistons, and containing oil, were inserted in the metal of the gun, opening at right angles into the bore, so that the pressure of the gasses would drive in the piston, compressing the oil. An arrangement was made by which the piston marked the distance to which it was forced into the cylinder, thus registering the compression. The force required to compress the oil to the same extent was afterwards ascertained by means of a lever and weight. The pressure in several parts of the bore was then measured, and was found to be about 25,000 lbs. to the square inch near the breach, and to diminish rapidly toward the muzzle.—Scientific American.


