CURE FOR SHEEP-CHASING DOGS.—Your correspondent "Straightforward" tells us how he has cured some dogs addicted to chasing sheep. He recommends much patience; in this I quite agree, but to cure a confirmed "chaser" requires more than most men possess. Your correspondent fears a Newfoundland or any other large breed after he has tasted blood is incurable. I can assure him to the contrary. A large deerhound of mine, or rather of my father's (a prize winner at Birmingham) with not being well looked after, got into the habit of chasing sheep, and killing them too, whenever he had an opportunity. He was sharply corrected and kept chained up for some days, but when again taken out was as bad as ever. My father happily remembered how he had cured a large retriever of the same sin five-and-thirty years before, and we have, I am pleased to say, made a perfect cure of my deerhound. After one of his chases he was taken up to the sheep farm, securely tied between two old Scotch rams and then let loose in the yard.
No sooner were they let loose, than all three being good jumpers, they cleared the wall, and the dog was dragged about the park until all three were dead tired. The poor fellow was then taken home, and I can assure you "sheep chasing" is now the very last thing of all others that he ever thinks of.—London Field.

THE KITCHEN GARDEN.—It is a matter of astonishment that so many farmers appear to be indifferent to the kitchen garden. There are many vegetables like celery, lettuce, asparagus, rhubarb and many others that might be named, that are absolutely indispensable in their season upon every well supplied table. They are healthful, as well as palatable, and no farmer should deprive his family of an abundant supply of them. Besides the garden, if conveniently located, as it should be, near the house, need not occupy an unreasonable amount of time, but offers a place where many an odd hour may be profitably employed. There is no estimating the saving which might be effected by greater attention to the garden.
The fact is, the farmer is better situated to have upon his table every luxury in the way of vegetables and small fruits, since he can produce them himself, than any other class of people, but in point of fact how few avail themselves of the advantages of this position.
What is more healthful than rhubarb, or pie-plant, in its season, and yet how few gardens contain it! Who would deprive his family of celery, and yet how few gardens give it any place.

WEEDS.—One of the greatest nuisances in farming is the way that weeds are encouraged and protected in the crooks and vicinity of fences, from which place their seeds are scattered over the surrounding land. The extent to which seed is carried by high winds proves that one negligent farmer may annoy hundreds of farms by the tolling to exterminate the foul herbage. Could the evils be concentrated on the farm which nurses weeds, the consequences would be a proper punishment for his carelessness and criminality—for criminal is any man who nurtures noxious weeds that thus injure the surrounding farmers. The fellow who keeps a bull-dog that annoys if not bites the passing travelers, may be reached by the law that is powerless to expose the injury occasioned to his neighbors by the nurseries of four weeds which are harbored about his premises, especially in the vicinity of his fences.
