

The Farmers' Department.

THE POOR FARMER.—We saw the other day in one of our exchanges, a little paragraph with this heading, in which it was justly said that a "poor farmer cannot conceal the fact that he is a poor farmer." Nothing can be truer. His work lies before the world. Every passer can look upon it and record his judgment. There are his house, his barn, his out-buildings, his implements, his horses and cattle. If he is a poor farmer it will be seen in all these. His very house-yard and barnyard speak of his want of industry and thrift, in clear language. Yet there is no one more difficult to instruct or reform than the man who is determined to pursue his own wretched course, in the face of all his neighbors and the whole community. And there are two reasons for it. First, he loves the rum bottle; and if not this, then he is naturally lazy and a poor devil generally. In either case he has no future to live and work for; no pride or self-respect. If he is spoken to on the subject, he replies that he thinks his mode of managing his farm the best; and he is a farmer bred, his father a farmer before him; and he has nothing to learn from the jimerack course of modern days, by which, though the land may yield more, the cost in making it do so is far more than what he loses. As to his implements, when they are worn out, he may think about getting others, but sees no use in throwing tools away that answer well enough. As to his house and garden, they are the same his father had, and if they were good enough for his father, what right had he to complain?

He has little to send to market, and that a kind neighbor takes and sells for him. Ask him why he does not raise more for marketing, and he replies that it does not pay; the time and expense consumed in going to market, the wear and tear of horses and wagons, come to more than what can be made out of it. He has reckoned it out and knows. If asked why he does not substitute a different variety of corn, oats, or other grain, for that from which he derives only half a crop, he replies that he gets along well enough with what he has, and it is adapted to his land, while new sorts may not be. Everything is managed or mismanaged in the same way. Look at the broken shelves of his hay wagon; his cart with a wooden linch-pin in one of the axles; the wheel-barrow with one leg; the roller, plows and harrows exposed all the year round to the weather, and some of them still lying where they were last used; the gears tied up with twine; the barn-yard fence broken and the cattle roaming through the meadows and tearing to pieces his couple of poor hay-stacks; the hogs rooting up the orchard and eating up the roots of the remaining grass; the fence in front of the house blown over by the wind three or four months ago and still lying there; the approach to the house thick with mud; coal-ashes, flat-stones or boards are to be seen. Everything indeed is in keeping, and however unpleasing and even painful it may be to others, and however impossible it may seem to others that the poor farmer cannot but see it and deplore it too, though helpless to improve, it is not so. He does not see it. He will not know it. He likes it as it is!

MIXED STOCK IN PASTURE.—I noticed, some time ago, a good deal written about keeping a mixed stock in pasture. As I have been a keeper of stock from early youth until now, I venture to give my opinion. And first, I have found that sheep do very well amongst cattle, but cattle do badly amongst sheep. To prove it, let the farmer take the fodder left by the cattle, even when part of it has been trodden under their feet, and if the sheep are not fully fed, they will see the sheep eat it up very greedily; and then let him take what his sheep leave and offer it to his cattle, and he will find they won't taste it if they can get anything else; or let him turn his milch cows into a sheep pasture, and he will find them to fail in milk. Cattle do very well where horses pasture. In proof of this, every farmer must have seen that cattle will eat the litter of horses, even if fully fed, but horses won't eat what cattle leave, unless compelled to do so. But horses and sheep will do well in the same pasture, especially the horses. To prove this, let the farmer turn out the sheep from their yard and turn in his horses, and they will eat all the sheep have left, even the litter around the racks.
