Rev. Henry Miller, of Turbottville, North Co., has purchased the grounds and buildings of the Juniata Academy, located at Shirleyburg, Huntingdon Co., and has engaged competent assistant Teachers.

Twelve licenses were granted at the recent Term in Juniata county. In Backs 126, Chester 70, Delaware 28, Montgomery 114.

The corner stone of the large new house for the Lutheran church of Danville, was laid last week, with addresses &c. before a numerous audience.

The Associate Judges of Northumberland county met on Tuesday week to grant Tavern Licenses. The applications granted amounted to 55, last year 42. One only was rejected.

There are at present 264 patients in the State Lunatic Hospital, near Harrisburg. The total number of patients admitted since the commencement of the Hospital, is 951.

In the District Court of Philadelphia on Saturday, a little episode occurred, in which, Judge Sharswood, with great propriety, ordered the arrest of a member of the bar for giving the lie, in open court, to another member of the profession.

The Dauphin & Susquehanna Coal Company, on Saturday last, made an assignment of its effects to Pierre Choteau Jr., Wm. H. Gebhard and John F. Butterworth, in trust for the benefit of its creditors.

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The bill changing the venue in the case of Mrs. Veitangruber, from Sullivan to Lycoming county, passed both branches of the Legislature.

Mr. Faries, the Chief Engineer of the Sunbury & Erie road, and Mr. Morrison, his principal assistant, have been in Sunbury making examinations and surveys for the purpose of connecting with the Northern Central in Market street.

The Sunbury & Erie will run in a straight line from Market street up Deer street, and continue until it intersects the present line of the Sunbury & Erie. Through the upper end, for several hundred yards, there will be trussel work.

This link will be less than half a mile, and can be finished in a month. The location for the passenger station has not yet been determined.

The Northern Central has made some extensive culverts of stone masonry in Deer street, one of them some 500 feet in length. They are now building several shallow culverts in the crossing of Market street.

The new Ligation Law promises plenty of food for litigation and fees for lawyers. The Judge in Northampton county decided that Courts had discriminating power to reject applications for licenses, while in Lancaster and Dauphin it is decided that all who conform to the rules shall be licensed.

Judge Galbraith of Erie decided that no publication of application need be made, while others contended that all licenses except for eating houses must be advertised.

J. Howard Sharp, (the "Apolonichon" of yore?) is performing in Snyder county. The Supreme Court, sitting at Harrisburg, has rejected the application of Wm. J. Clark, of Danville, for a new trial. He is under sentence for murder, and must die.

Frank Butcher, a Mail agent on the Cattawissa, Williamsport and Elmira mail train, was arrested by special Agent Mr. Moore on Tuesday week, at Williamsport, charged with robbing the U. S. Mail. He has been released on bail.

Trial to come off on the 21st of June in the U. S. District court at Williamsport. The majority of Alexander Henry, who has been inaugurated Mayor of Philadelphia, is 4,702. The others vary, from 2,800, upwards.

A boatman arrested in Williamsport on a charge of dealing in counterfeit money, was discharged.
