OREGON.

The Hon. John P. Gaines of Ky. has been appointed Governor of Oregon by Gen. Taylor, and has accepted. He is one of Nature's noblemen, and was chosen to Congress in '47 by 110 majority in a district usually against us. This year he has been run out simply because he reported a bill last Winter to abolish the Slave Trade in the District of Columbia, and would not, like his opponent, go the whole hog for Slavery Extension at all hazards and to the last extremity. Slavery is just now in the condition of a somebody foretold in Scripture as "having wrath, because he knoweth he hath but a short time" (Rev. xii. 12.) We regret that the Whig party has to bear the consequences of that flurry through the defeat of such men as Maj. Gaines, but these reverses will work out good in the end. Meantime we thank Gen. Taylor and his Cabinet for their admirable selection of a Governor for Oregon.

We learn that Gen. Edward Hamilton has been appointed Secretary of Oregon. Gen. Hamilton was formerly editor of the Portsmouth (Ohio) Tribune. In the late war with Mexico he commanded one of the companies of the First Regiment of Ohio Volunteers.

A disturbance occurred at Harrisburg on Saturday night, which was created by the impression that a number of runaway slaves were secreted in the town. A row occurred at the door of a church, where some of the slaves were supposed to be. The Sheriff armed a party of men to restore order. Four colored men were arrested, but the slaves escaped, and it is said are on their northward journey.

New York, Oct. 2. Three thousand five hundred and twenty dogs were killed this year in the city, South of Forty second street, at an expense of \$1700.

Thomas Hertell, Esq., an old citizen, died this morning, aged 78 years.

In the Supreme Court, on Saturday the wife of the notorious E. Z. C. Judson obtained under the new code a decree of divorce against him, on the ground of cruelty and adultery.

The State has doubtless gone for Gamble, and the Democrats have probably carried the Legislature. The vote was light, and the returns come in slowly.

The whole Whig ticket in Union county is said to have from 1 to 600 maj.

Northumberland it is reported elects all the Dem. nominees. Milton only 41 for Fuller, Chillisquogue 54 for Gamble, and Point a small maj. for Fuller.

Columbia, 800 for Gamble. Fortner, Whig, elected to the Assembly. Schockell, small maj. for Fuller—each party one Member.

Philad. City elects Joel Jones, Independent, for Mayor. County, doubtful. Lancaster, 2500. Berks 3000.

The election in Lewisburg went off very quietly, 314 votes being polled. The people voted independently, and as far as we know without any trading or swapping of candidates. Very many Democrats voted for Col. Slifer, because they knew and respected him as a man and a citizen—and many Whigs cast their votes for Mr. Gamble on account of friendship, relationship, acquaintance, West Branch's, and because they believed he would be more sure to attend to the Crosscut opposite the Borough.

Lycyoming County. The whole Democratic County Ticket is elected by respectable majorities. The remaining townships to be heard from will increase Gamble's majority to about 625.

Packer's to about 400. Brindle's to about 300, and Dunn's to about 300.—Lycyoming Gazette.

Clinton County. Lock Haven, Oct. 10, 1849.

Our returns are not as full as we expected to have them. Gamble's majority will be between 250 and 300. For Senator, Packer about 250 majority. Assembly, Dunn, Dem., 350 to 400 majority, and Brindle, 250 majority. The whole Democratic county ticket is elected by decided majorities.—Clinton Democrat.

Wm. B. Foster, Esq. it appears has accepted the appointment of Chief Engineer on the North Branch Canal. We perceive that he invites proposals, (to be received at Tunkhannock until the 12th of November) for constructing a number of sections on that work.

Louisville, Oct. 1. The State Convention called together for the purpose of remodelling the Constitution of this State was organized to-day. James M. Guthrie, Democrat, of this city, was elected President, and Thomas J. Helm, Secretary. The vote for President was as follows: Guthrie, 50; Nixon, 43.

Treating for Office—Who are the men that are at this dirty work again? Let the moral and religious portion of the community set their faces against the vile practice. They owe it to their children their country and their God.

The foregoing is from the "Good Samaritan," a paper devoted principally to Temperance; lachrymose that temperance printers conform to the temperance law requiring license notices to be published; and wondrous vigilant in discovering and proclaiming what unns Elders and Class Leaders find most suitable for themselves, as also that some of them prefer and applaud other modes and topics of oratory than their own. We have often been urged by his patrons and others to call him out on the point branched above. Annually, does he urge others to put down this "vile and dirty" practice—he calls for a wholesale prohibition of liquor selling, and demands that Legislative candidates be pledged to such a law. He pounces upon a liquor advertisement in a newspaper as a public enormity. Thus set as a watch man upon the walls, the least that could be expected of him would be that he would distinctly warn the people if an intemperate man was put up for office, and especially if he attempted to defame and corrupt the voters by "treating." The "Samaritan" knew there was just such a man before the people for a high and responsible office—not a man who now and then takes a drink and invites a friend to drink, simply—but one who drinks and treats, day after day systematically, profusely, notoriously, disgustingly, and probably has made and is making more drunkenness than any other tea men in Union county, tavern-keepers included: but not a word of warning appeared against him in the Samaritan, tho' his opponent is and long has been an irreproachable and blameless temperance man. No one would expect the Samaritan to enter into a partisan warfare, but its duty to warn the people against such an unblushing corruptor as he who declared in a public meeting that "if there was no one else to treat, Jack Cummings always had a sixpence in his pocket," is too plain to be doubted. From the Samaritan, devoted as it is to temperance, its readers knew not which of the two candidates for Legislature was correct, and its obscure hints were as likely to injure one as the other. Opposed as the mass of the people are to making temperance a party hobby, they are more opposed to being represented abroad by a man who relies upon the rum-bottle for his success. Many look to the Samaritan to inform them as to the character of the man up for office, as regards temperance; but instead of such practical information, they are informed that the "Star" advertised brandy, that a Class Leader stopped with Keckler instead of Harrison, or an Elder took the "Times" instead of the "Samaritan," or that he spent a tavern license in one corner of the Chronicle, or that some temperance man hurraed louder at a party meeting than under one of his subduing temperance efforts—thus "straining at a gnat and swallowing a camel." There may be cases where it would be difficult or useless to state facts as to candidates—but in stating the habits and course of the two candidates for Assembly there was no doubt or difficulty. The only excuse we have heard for the course of the Samaritan, is that Mr. Cummings is its editor's client and a kind of cousin. The election is over, and the point alluded to above is thought by many worthy of the attention of the vigilant editor of the Samaritan.

Foreign News. TURKEY. Honor to the Sultan! Honor the Turkish Minister! They have nobly done their duty, and have refused to become panderers to the vindictive blood-thirsting of Francis Joseph and Nicholas. The Russian Ambassador at the Porte demanded the extradition of the Hungarian officers Kossuth, Dembinski, Perzel, Meusermann, and their companions.

A Russian General arrived at Constantinople on the 15th, on special mission. That special mission being to bully the Sultan into a compliance with the demands of Austria, a council was held and the Turkish Government resolved not to surrender the Hungarian refugees to either the Russian or Austrian Government. On their decision being communicated to the Sultan he declared, in the most impressive and determined manner that the refugees should not be given up let the consequences be what they might.

We trust that Lord Palmerston will do his duty as nobly as the Sultan has done his—that Russia and Austria will be given to understand that war with Turkey for such a cause means war with England.

We are pleased to find that Kossuth and his companions are furnished with passports from the English Ambassador, and we trust that every assistance to support him will be rendered by England in gaining the independence of his country, against the attacks of Russia and vassal Austria—London Sun.

Progress of the Pope. The Pope has quitted Gaeta and has proceeded to Naples, where he has taken up his abode in the Palazzo Reale. His reception at Naples was of the most striking and popular character. The Pope evinces no intention of returning to Rome at present, and thus far no real progress seems to have been made towards the satisfactory solution of the Italian question.
