How to Treat Balking Horses—If you have balking horses, it is your own fault, and not the horse's, for if they do not pull true, there is some cause for it, and if you will remove the cause, the effect will cease.

How to Have Mealy Potatoes—It is a very common thing in the spring to find strong potatoes on the table, unless care has been taken to select and preserve them.

Sulphurous Acid.—The English Medical Times has a correspondent who writes that he has found sulphurous acid to be one of the best means for promoting the speedy union of parts which have been divided during surgical operations.

Bert Sugar in California.—George Gordon, of San Francisco, states that an arrangement has been made with an association of German and French gentlemen, now engaged in the sugar business in Europe, to erect in California factories for the manufacture of raw sugar from beets.

Old Times in Illinois.—Some of the correspondents of the Prairie Farmer are indulging in reminiscences. One man bought some rough split bottom chairs at 50c each, when he was married in 1828, and paid for them in No. 1 fall wheat, at 25c per bushel.

Queen of Puddings.—One pint of nice fine bread crumbs, one quart of milk, one cup of sugar, the yolks of four eggs beaten, the grated rind of a lemon, a piece of butter, the size of an egg. Bake until done, but not watery. Whip the whites of the egg stiff, beat in a teaspoonful of sugar in which has been strained the juice of lemon, spread over the pudding a layer of jelly, and the whites of the eggs over this, replace in the oven, bake lightly. To be eaten cold with cream, if preferred. Decidedly the best of all puddings; something new.

Lemon Custard.—One cup of sugar, yolks of three eggs, two and one-eighth cups of sweet milk, one tablespoon of flour, grated rind, the juice and pulp of one lemon, a little salt. Bake with one crust. For the frosting, whites of three eggs beaten to a stiff froth, and five table-spoons of white sugar. Put on the pie when hot, and return to the oven five minutes.

Disease of Sheep.—For worm in the head—turn into their nostrils a few drops of spirits of turpentine, hold up their nose a few minutes, and repeat daily until cured of the disease.

For the stretches—give yarrow tea or physic.

For the sores—Give sulphur.

It is advisable, in the construction of poultry houses, to use pine lumber—the more it contains the better—as this is offensive to poultry vermin.
