Bible Society.—On June 19 there was organized in this city, an "Auxiliary Branch, for St. George Stake, of the American Bible Society," with Henry Eyring, Prest.; James G. Bleak, Vice Prest.; A. R. Whitehead, Secy.; Richard Bentley, Treas.; Thomas Judd, Cor. Secy.; and Minerva W. Snow and Susie Y. Gates, extra members of the Board.

Earthquake.—A slight shock of earthquake was felt in this city on July 2, at a quarter past 8 o'clock a. m., lasting about two seconds. We did not notice any rumbling noise, but things in our office rattled and the building rocked to and fro.

OUR SYSTEM
Briefly explained, is as follows: The unit of measurement for all Type bodies, is American, which is exactly one-twelfth of Pica. This is the smallest and is applied only to Leads and Rules. All the other bodies bear exact relations to this as indicated by numbers. From American to Nonpareil, which is numbered 6, they increase progressively by one-half the body of the first. Beyond this, to Pica, by an increase the size of American. There are no bastard or irregular sizes.
Each size is a factor. Three Nonpareils (6) are a Great Primer (18); three Breviers (8) are a Double Pica (24); a Nonpareil (6) and a Brevier (8) are an English (14), or Two-line Minion; a Pica (12) and an Excelsior (4)—two 6-to-Pica Leads—are a Columbian (16); a Double English (28) and a Brevier (8) are a Double Great Primer (36); so with all of the other sizes, making the combination of two or more sizes of type in a word or line, the simplest thing imaginable in composition. That odd body, Bourgeois (9), is now a respectable size, being a Nonpareil (6) and one-half exactly.
Look over the figures and test the simplicity of the new system of Type bodies.
