New Head For Lehi Schools

Grade Schools and High School to be Consolidated Under One Management.

At the high school board meeting in American Fork, Monday, James H. Walker, C. W. Whittaker and W. K. Hopkins were chosen as the principals of the Pleasant Grove, the American Fork and the Lehi high schools, respectively, for the ensuing year.

Mr. Walker will also be the principal of the grades of Pleasant Grove and Mr. Whittaker will supervise the grades of American Fork, and while the official step has not been taken, it is understood that an agreement has been reached whereby Mr. Hopkins will head both the grades as well as the high school of Lehi.

Professor Hopkins has taught in the Lehi high school for the past eight years, during most of which time he has been its principal. Prior to coming to Lehi he taught four years in the grades. He is a graduate from the high school of the B. Y. U. and holds his bachelor's degree from the State University.

Mr. A. B. Anderson, the retiring supervisor of the grades, has had a wide experience as a teacher in the public schools, as principal of the Uintah Academy at Vernal and as principal of the Beaver branch of the B. Y. U. As head of the schools in Lehi he has brought them up to a high standard, his most notable work being the introduction of studies that specially qualify the students for life in the community in which they live.

SPECIAL MEETING OF HOME ECONOMICS
