Sharp will have command of the sanitary corps and will be chief medical officer. Lieut. Floyd Barnum will be quartermaster for field and camp, for both men and animals. Between 450 and 500 state troops will participate and one full company of United States Infantry.

New Military Reserve Scene of Encampment

Regular Troops and National Guard to Rendezvous on Tract Near Lehi Recently Withdrawn as Military Reservation.

The first encampment to be held on the new military reservation west of Jordan River will take place in the early part of next month.

All branches of the National Guard of Utah, excepting the signal corps, are to rendezvous at Provo on August 2 for the annual state encampment maneuvers, participating in the affairs with regular troops. General orders to this effect have been issued by Adjutant General Wedgewood. Company A from Ogden will probably leave Ogden on Saturday night, August 1, for Provo.

The signal corps, under command of Capt. E. L. Bourne, will march from Salt Lake City to Jordan narrows and go into camp. Those organizations that are to go into rendezvous at Provo are headquarters for five companies of infantry; first battery, field artillery, detachment of sanitary troops and one company of United States Infantry not yet designated by the war department.

The first battery will be supplied with horses at Provo. From that point the battery will march to the new state military encampment reservation and go into camp with the signal corps. These organizations will join the infantry later in the field maneuvers near Alpine. The field artillery and signal corps will comprise the defensive force against the infantry when that organization approaches Jordan narrows. The positions of the defensive force will not be made known in advance.

The infantry will be under instruction for five days on their march toward Salt Lake. The column will reach Fort Douglas the sixth day and camp will be established for eight days, during which company and battalion drill will be taken up and company competitions for rifle teams will be conducted on the rifle ranges.

The signal corps and battery, after the field maneuvers at Alpine, will go into camp on the state military reservation for instruction and special work particularly adapted to these organizations. They will rejoin the other troops at Fort Douglas two days before camp is broken.
