COUNTY FINANCIAL REPORT.

Provo, July 13.—The annual financial report of Utah county for the fiscal year ending June 30 has been compiled by County Auditor A. V. Robison. The report, under the head of resources, shows cash on hand \$11,102.91, and other property amounting to \$124,678.65. There is \$356.79 in outstanding warrants, making the net total resources \$135,138.09. Included in the resources and the two largest items are the county infirmary and grounds, valued at \$64,000, and four-fifths interest in the county court house and grounds, valued at \$35,000.

There was \$11,181.23 cash on hand June 30, 1914; the receipts for the year were \$139,493.82, of which \$92,367.72 was from taxes. The disbursements were \$139,199.52, of which \$32,672.76 was spent on highways, \$19,737.95 for salaries, \$10,590.46 for poor and indigent, \$9,965.58 for maintenance of county infirmary and \$14,218.06 for restoring the infirmary building damaged by fire a year ago.
