Passing of John N. Thomas

John N. Thomas, son of Richard Thomas, recently died in the Bear River Valley. Following is from the Garland Globe: "Last Sunday evening in Elwood, John N. Thomas, who recently returned with his family from Burley, Idaho, succumbed to the effects of consumption. He is survived by a wife and two small children, his father, Richard Thomas of Lehi, and two sisters. Deceased was born in Lehi, June 4, 1847. Mr. Thomas was well known in this city, having been employed by the Sugar Company in its campaigns for a number of years. Impressive funeral services were held at Elwood Tuesday at 2 o'clock p. m., Bishop J. K. Fridal presiding. Eleven Sugar Company officials and employes were in attendance at the services, also Mesdames T. H. Edwards, G. R. Korh and George T. Rogers. The opening song by the Elwood choir was "Wanted on the Other Side." Prayer by A. R. Astel; Singing, "Sometime You Will Understand." The speakers were Moshiah Evans, Charlie Edwards, G. R. Korh, Jos. Lehi Boy Is Making Good

Earl Jones, a son of Thomas Jones, returned home this week from Millard county, where he has been spending the past two months studying the life and habits of the alfalfa thrips for the state Agricultural College. Mr. Jones was a student of the college last year. This destructive little insect, about one-eighth of an inch in length, creating such destruction in the neighborhood of Hinkley, that the alfalfa seed yields have fallen to but one per cent of a crop, and absolute failure is threatened. Mr. Jones has learned, by the use of a compound microscope, that the insect lays its eggs in the tender tissues of the leaves and blossoms, and after multiplying several times during the season, the larvae in the roots of the plant, it lives by tearing and sucking the leaves and flowers, causing the latter to fall before becoming poisoned. The little animal can be found by shaking a bunch of lucern blossoms in your hand. It is very active and under a compound microscope looks almost like a grasshopper. He has gathered and mounted a lot of samples for use at the college and will continue the study during the next month, which he will spend at home. He also says that the alfalfa weevil is becoming rather numerous in Millard county and next year will cause the farmers lots of trouble.
