The judges are today visiting the pigs being raised by the sixteen boys who are in the boys contest for growing hogs. The boys have been feeding the hogs for sixteen weeks, and the one who has made the greatest success with the most economical feeding, will be adjudged the winner. The boys have all kept records in detail of their work.

Pickling Station to be Enlarged

Prosperous Institution Will Double Its Capacity and Increase Its Acreeage in Lehi.

The Capital Pickle company of Salt Lake City will enlarge its Lehi plant to about double its present capacity before commencing operations next year. Its present plant is located partly on city property and partly on railroad property. Application for the necessary ground for the addition will be made to the City Council at its next session.

So many people have indicated a desire to increase the acreage next year, that the company seriously contemplates transferring its Springville business to Lehi. Andrew Jacobs manages both plants which could be done much more effectively if they were in the same city under one roof.

The pickle company is receiving many more cucumbers than ever before, the increase already being more than fifty per cent over last year. The delivery is beginning to drop off, but they are now coming in at the rate of from eight to ten tons per day. One day last week over thirteen tons were delivered. Seven immense tanks, twelve feet in diameter and about ten feet high, have been filled with small sized cucumbers, and over three hundred fifty gallon barrels have been filled with dill pickles of a larger size. The dill weed, for preserving the pickles, is grown opposite the Salt Lake Route depot. Two car loads of the salt pickles were shipped to Salt Lake City the past week to make room for others coming in.

Some of the growers are getting immense yields. John Smith, who has one acre, delivers about nine hundred pounds per day. One day last week he delivered 1350 pounds. His record for August was over 11,000 pounds of small ones and over 7,000 pounds of the larger size, besides probably a thousand pounds too large to deliver at all or a total of nearly ten tons for which he received a check for approximately \$175.00 from one acre, for the month of August.

After the first frost all picking will be stopped and many small boys are praying for frost now.

Will Burn Lime Monday

W. S. Evans completed his lime kiln this week and commenced loading it yesterday with coal and limestone. The kiln is located at the Jordan Narrows station on the Orem road, and the rock from which the lime will be burned will come from a big deposit of water formation a few hundred yards above. The kiln is thirty feet high by ten feet in diameter and has walls four feet thick. The men have been a month in building it, part of the time nine men having been employed under the direction of Bishop Andrew Fjeld. It will have a capacity of 150 bushels of lime per day, which will be about the amount supplied to the Lehi sugar factory and its cutting stations during the cutting season. Three men will be employed at the kiln under the superintendency of C. E. Thomas of Pleasant Grove.

The rock is said to be the best in the state for lime purposes, burning to a greater purity and with less fuel. The location of the plant will enable the owners to supply a great part of the Salt Lake and Utah county markets.

Cedar Fort Gym. Contract Let

Christian Talboe of Provo, was this week given the contract to erect the School Gymnasium and Amusement Hall to be built by the Cedar Fort School board. Talboe's bid was \$6,240, nearly \$1000 lower than any other bidder. There were six bids. The other five were Chipman Merc. company American Fork, \$7,200; A. K. Thornton & Son American Fork, \$7,300; Reese & Company Salt Lake City, \$7,320; Snyder & Told Provo, \$7,415, and Paxman and Cramer, \$7,730.

The School board intends to commence work at once. They are delighted that the building can be constructed for nearly \$2,000 less than the architect's estimate. Practically all the material has to be hauled in on the railroad and then hauled by wagon and team for several miles.
