Big Rabbit Hunt Is Planned

Salt Lake Route Will Run Special Train, and Cedar Valley Dry Farmers Will Supply Conveyances Free to the Hunters.

Arrangements are being perfected for a big rabbit hunt in Cedar Valley to be held some time during the present month. If the proposed plans mature it will be the biggest hunt ever pulled off in Cedar Valley.

Rabbits are reported more numerous in the valley this year than ever before in history. This year they have eaten up hundreds of acres of wheat, and are so numerous in some localities that the farmers have had to enclose their fields in rabbit tight fence in order to grow grain at all.

At the State Well, five miles south of Fairfield, and at the south end of the rabbit infested district, there are two 160-acre rabbit tight fenced enclosures, so situated that the rabbits that the hunter failed to shoot could be driven into them. The plan is to have three or four hundred hunters so organized that they would spread out at Fairfield and Cedar Fort and come together at the State Well, where it is estimated that 80 per cent of the rabbits in Cedar Valley will either have been shot or run into the enclosure.

War Tax Begins

New Law Taxing Telephone Users. (Special to Alpine Pub. Co.) Denver, November 30.—The far reaching effects of the European War will be felt in a small way by telephone users, according to the announcement made here today by the United States Internal Revenue Department.

Officials of the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company, operating in the seven mountain states, have been busy for the past month notifying exchanges in all parts of the system of the manner in which this tax is to be collected and turned over to the government. Notices have been sent to each of the 250,000 subscribers in the system and placards containing the provisions of the new law are to be posted in every pay station.

In some cases, according to officials of the telephone company, the cost of collecting the tax from public pay stations will exceed the tax itself, but the new law is stringent and requires the collection to be made on every call.

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance levying a tax and for the assessment of property adjoining the side-walks hereinafter mentioned in Paving District No. 2, for the purpose of constructing and paying for cement side-walks hereinafter referred to.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of American Fork City, Utah, as follows:
Section I. That said American Fork City, and its City Council hereby levy the tax and provide for the assessment of the same upon property hereinafter described, in Paving District No. 2, for the purpose of constructing and paying for the construction of cement side-walks, to-wit:

Said tax shall become and be delinquent in ten equal yearly installments, with interest on the whole sum unpaid at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable at the time each installment is due, to-wit: One-tenth thereof on the 28th day of January, 1914; one-tenth thereof in one year after said date; one-tenth thereof in two years after said date; one-tenth thereof in three years after said date; one-tenth thereof in four years after said date; one-tenth thereof in five years after said date; one-tenth thereof in six years after said date; one-tenth thereof in seven years after said date; one-tenth thereof in eight years after said date; and one-tenth thereof in nine years after said date. In the event of any installment, or the interest aforesaid, not being paid on the date the same becomes due, the whole amount of the special tax unpaid at the time said installment and interest are due, shall become due and payable, and shall draw interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum, until the sale of the property assessed; provided, one or more installments, in the order in which they are payable, or the whole special tax unpaid, may be paid on the day any installment becomes due, by paying the amount thereof and interest to said date.
