Robinson Will Build Big Wheat Elevator

George G. Robinson was in Salt Lake City Tuesday and made arrangements for the construction of a big wheat elevator that will hold 43,000 bushels of wheat. The elevator will be made of concrete, heavily reinforced with strong steel rods. There will be five great cement tubes, each 20 feet in diameter and 40 feet high, with cement top and floor, which will make it absolutely fire and vermin proof. It will be erected immediately north of the mill and adjacent to the railroad switch. The four tubes will be in a square, with the fifth one in the center.
