Reflections On The European War

Editor Citizen:— In conversing with some people on the final outcome of the European War, and the effect it will have upon the world's future, I find quite a number who hope that the Germans will be victorious. This because of their higher development in art and science, and their superior powers of method and organization; thinking if they succeed, their success would lift the world to a higher plane of intelligence and inaugurate a new era of betterment to the world at large.

But it must be borne in mind that great intellectual attainment, unless it be governed by judicious moral restraint and laudible purpose, is only a mighty power for evil, and hence cannot be considered an elevating factor, unless the heart be attuned to the spirit of justice and human well-being—something that the Germans are lacking to a marked degree, as is clearly evidenced by their present inhuman, unrelenting brutality.

Of course the other nations are not altogether free from the same charges, but following the political history of the Germans for many years past, one can clearly perceive a growing desire for military distinction and increased national aggrandizement, and viewed in this light, instead of German success proving a world blessing it would be much more likely to result in ruin in disaster to other weaker nations. I think that we are not overdrawn the question when we say that Germany, in this deplorable, devastating war, is the cause of the world's suffering, and hence, we think, all things fairly considered, it would be a blessing to the world—especially to the nations of Europe—if the spirit of militarism and conquest in the Hohenzollern race should be humbled and subdued by the content allies, and a consistent, safe and lasting peace be secured to the hapless warring nations.—J. C.
