

You Will Lose Old Pittsburg Mine

Famous in Early Days Will Operated Through Long Tunnel Driven From Alta Side.

It has been known all summer that the Little Cottonwood or Alta mine, located on the divide between American Fork canyon and Alta, had a big force of men doing preparatory work on the property. It would be learned of their doings, property is on a high hill a distance from the other mines and the property came and went by way of following article taken from the News indicates that while the property is in American Fork canyon business and shipments would be way of Alta.

The Little Cottonwood or Alta ridge, the Pittsburg Consolidated Mining and Milling company being the first tunnel through to American Fork side. The company is now putting in bunk houses, blacksmith shop and buildings to insure work this year. Just as soon as the buildings are completed the tunnel will be completed. When complete it will be 100 feet long and will give a depth of 100 feet lower than the present level in the property.

Tarbet is president and manager; H. Green, vice president; J. Little, secretary and treasurer; with Bismarck Snyder and P. Leggett compose the directorate. J. Leggett is consulting engineer and assistant manager. Mr. Tarbet is the controlling factor in the property since 1905.

The property is situated on the east fork side of the divide between Little Cottonwood and American Fork. It is along the Pittsburg vein, along which considerable mining has been done in the early days. For 25 or 30 years this property has been operated at various times. It is worked by three tunnels, driven to tap the fissure, the lower tunnel cutting the fissure at about 400 feet from the surface. All three tunnels are in approximately 500 feet from their respective portals and are connected by ad raises.

No. 1 or the upper tunnel cuts the fissure about 25 feet from the surface, a large body of ore, estimated 11,000 tons was extracted early days. The lower or No. 3 was driven for a distance of 200 feet and the fissure was tapped 200 feet below the surface. At this time a winze was sunk on the No. 2, or the middle tunnel, 90-odd feet to connect with No. 3. This winze developed a large amount of lead-carbonate making off in the beds. The work was suspended at this time due to the financial conditions.

The company started work last year with a small crew of men. Considerable work was necessary to make the property accessible by trail to the American Fork road, and establish a camp at the mine. At present the force consists of some 15 men under the direction of Dan Doyle.

Will Dedicate Stake Tabernacle Oct. 24th

President Chipman desires that the house will be filled on the occasion, and for this reason asked that all members of the Theological and Parent's Classes of the Sunday Schools be present, though he expressly stated that the Sunday Schools were to continue as usual and the members could attend in the afternoon if they desired.

At the Union meeting, it was given out that the Sunday School union meetings hereafter would be held on the Third Sunday of each month, instead of meeting on Stake Union day. This will necessitate changing the day for home missionaries from the 3rd to the 4th Sunday of each month though for this month, they will visit tomorrow as usual.

President Chipman gave a resume of the instructions given at general conference. Dr. H. C. Holbrook of Lehi who leaves in the near future for a mission to Great Britain, gave a talk and Lloyd Cullimore of London, who goes to the Southern States made a brief address. Dr. R. J. Evans, of the U. A. C. of Logan, made some remarks.

Hauling Mine Timber To Texan Mine
Robert Lee unloaded a car of mine timber this week for Charley Tyng. It came direct from the mills sawed and morticed ready for setting up. The posts are 8 by 8 inches and 6 feet 6 inches long. The caps are 8 inches square and long enough to provide for a tunnel 4 feet wide. The sills are only 6 inches thick, 8 inches wide and the same length as the caps. The lagging is 2 by 8 inches, 12 by 14 feet long. John McTague and John Beck commenced hauling these timbers up to the mine Wednesday, hauling about 1,000 feet at a time.

The timber will be used in a new tunnel that has been commenced on the Texan and which is intended to take an ore deposit between the lower tunnel and shaft. The new bunk houses have been completed, giving the men ample living accommodations. Six miners under the direction of Mr. Harry Kruse have been working on the Texan and now that the new buildings are up eight more will be added to the force.

The Pacific people have now cut their ore with their work on the tunnel level and the men are drifting both ways on the big vein. It is reported that some fine bunches of ore are being encountered, and that a shipment will probably be made this fall. The development of the Pacific vein is being watched with keener interest than anything else in the canyon.
