## City Council Appoints Judges of Election

State Road To Be Improved—Library To Occupy New Home November 1st.—Rantovsky Defies City.

The regular session of the City Council was held Tuesday evening, with Councilman Wing absent because of illness.

Some time ago the council condemned the residence of August Rantovsky, located on the lot east of the Tithing office, as being dangerous from fire because of its close proximity to the barn of G. A. Wall. The recorder read a letter from Mr. Rantovsky who in effect says that the council has not right to condemn his house or remove his renter without his consent. He continues, "Let it be known that my house is going to remain unmoved as long as I own it." If the council wants it vacated, it must pay him \$4 per month rental or he will sell it to the city. He closed by saying "henceforth leave me and my place and affairs alone."

There has been trouble for years as to who should build the bridge over the ditches and canals in the city, Lehi City or the Lehi Irrigation Co. Israel Evans, George G. Webl and George Y. Myers, representing the Irrigation Co., were present and after a discussion of the question, a motion was carried that a committee of two, consisting of W. S. Evans and George G. Robinson, be appointed to meet with the irrigation company to work out a plan agreeable to both parties.

The question of notifying the property owners of their paving dues was left to the Treasurer and Recorder.

The council agreed to spend next Wednesday at the Alpine Springs and will probably decide on some plan to increase the city's water supply.

The street committee was instructed to work in connection with the council on spending the one mill State Road tax on the State road between the San Pedro crossing and the People's Co-op.

The committee on Library in connection with the Mayor, was instructed to make arrangements to transfer the city library to its new home on the school lot before November 1st.

Bills aggregating \$321.85 were allowed.

## Big Yield of Dry Farm Wheat

Over 25,000 Bushels Grown in Lehi Precinct.

The dry farms in Lehi precinct have this year produced over 25,000 bushels of hard winter wheat of the Turkey Red variety and grown it without irrigation. It was raised on land that but a few years ago was considered as worthless and covered with sage brush. It is estimated that less than one half of the available area is now under cultivation. Some say that in a few years four times the above yield will be grown.

## Single Germ Beet Seed

Government Expert, Who Commenced Work in Lehi Eleven Years Ago, Hopes to Make Experiments a Success.

In 1904, Dr. C. O. Townsend, came to Lehi from Washington, D. C. to conduct experiments in single germ sugar beet seed. Every beet grower well knows that each little hard ball, containing the seed, has from 2 to 4 seeds or germs each. Usually these seed all sprout so that when they come up, they are in clusters, making it necessary for boys to creep along the rows on their knees, and carefully separate and remove all but one of these little beets. It cannot be done with a hoe, because the plants are so close, having all come up from one seed.

If the seed could be dropped far enough apart so that the thinning could be done with a hoe, it is estimated that there would be a saving annually to the beet growers of America of over \$3,000,000.

The multiple germ seeds are caused by the flowers being so close together on the stems that several units in the production of one seed ball occasionally these flowers are more widely separated on the stem, and the result is a single germ seed. Dr. Townsend commenced his experiments by taking the pollen from a single flower and pollenizing another single flower, and then covering them with little bags so that insects and the wind could not pollenize from other flowers.

Because Dr. Townsend has not been around Lehi for several years, many thought that the experiment had been abandoned, but it appears that he has kept up the breeding for a single-germ seed for the past eleven years and hopes to ultimately be successful in the last issue of a periodical called "Sugar" he has a long article containing the above information, and closes his story with the following paragraph:

To sum up the work, it is apparent that commercial beet plants normally produce a few single-germ seeds. Our problem was, by selection, to increase the proportion of single-germ seed from less than 5 per cent to 100. Our selected plants are now producing about 75 per cent of single-germ seeds and individual plants in a few cases show a somewhat higher percentage than this. The work and progress of single-germ beet seed production is based upon the fact that certain beet plants possess the ability to so develop the seed stems that the buds and flowers are separated from each other in the process of growth. This tendency to separate the flowers and thereby to produce single-germ seeds seems to be transmissible from parent to offspring; whether or not this will become a fixed character time only can tell. The indications are that this character will become fixed and that a reasonable amount of care on the part of the beet growers will make the production of single-germ beet seed commercially practicable.

## Death Relieves Patient Sufferer

Funeral Services Held in Tabernacle Monday, for Second Son of Bishop and Mrs. Efeld.

Funeral services for Carl Efeld who died Saturday were held Monday afternoon in the Tabernacle, which was well filled with sympathizing friends, who showed their sympathy by many floral tributes. Joseph Anderson of the First Ward Bishopric presided and read a biographical sketch. The other speakers were: A. B. Anderson, Edward Evans and A. J. Evans. Miss Leota Taylor sang "My Heavenly Father Knows," and Mrs. M. S. Lott sang "Oh My Father." A. R. Anderson gave the invocation and William Southwick the benediction.

Following is the biographical sketch: Wilford Carl was the fourth child of Bishop Andrew and Eliza Broadbent Efeld and was born in Lehi, June 4th, 1897. On his eighth birthday he was baptized a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and considering his age and opportunities he was well versed in its doctrines and had great faith in its principles. He was ordained a Deacon February 11, 1911. In his ninth year he became afflicted with rheumatism and since that time he has been a constant sufferer from this disease. For the last three years he has been confined to his bed and the two years preceding these his days were spent in a chair.

Although he was only in the third grade when he was compelled to discontinue school, by persistent effort he became quite a good reader and when not in much pain he spent the time reading papers, magazines and books. His mind was bright and active to the last and by his constant reading he was able to converse intelligently on the current news and topics of the day.

His extreme helplessness and dependence on others was a constant source of sorrow and regret to him and he thoughtfully considered how he might lessen the burden of those who waited on him. During his entire illness his little sisters have been most devoted and attentive in waiting upon him and have ever been ready to answer his every beck and call. In this way his burden on his parents have been materially lessened. His life has been a bright example of thoughtful patience and endurance.

May his rest be sweet and his resurrection glorious.

He passed to his reward October 9, 1915, aged 18 years 4 months and 5 days.

## Bishop J. G. Allred Talks of Canada

Bishop Garnett Allred, of Raymond, Canada, who is visiting with Mr. Allred's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Allred, says that Canada never had so bounteous a yield of wheat. The Knight Sugar Co. will thresh enough wheat to load a train of cars about 50 miles long. This company has a self loading machine that elevates the shocks of wheat into a rack 24 feet long which is hauled by four horses to the thresher direct from the field. Two such outfits keep one big threshing machine busy. The farms are all yielding from 40 to 60 bushels of wheat per acre which is selling at 80 cents per bushel.

Many farmers are getting into the lax business and are doing well. Others are going into the growing of cattle. The Bishop is in the cattle business, and reports all the Lehi people in Canada doing well.

## One Conductor That Should Go

The Orem Interurban is noted for the efficiency and courtesy of its officials in the general offices, for those in charge of the several stations, and the conductors and motormen on the road. Generally, their superiors in courtesy cannot be found. There is one, however, who for the antithesis of efficiency and courtesy it would be hard to beat. His name is Frank Corrigan.

Tuesday afternoon, as the 2:28 car pulled into Lehi, Mrs. Josh Whitman, Mrs. George Whitman and the latter's little girl went to board the car, they were told to "step aside till these people get off." Immediately after the passengers had alighted, Corrigan boarded his car and signalled the motorman to go ahead, without giving the Mesdames Whitman any chance whatever to get aboard.

Mr. Kirkham, the station agent, refunded the ladies their fares and then returned home.

It is said that this is not Corrigan's first offence of discourtesy, and many have made the remark that the road would well afford to put another conductor on his car.

Corrigan may have to part with ten months wages to assuage the wrath of the injured passengers who left standing with tickets in their hands as the car pulled out.

## Citizens' Primary Meets Tonight

To-night in the High School building will be named the city officials who will serve Lehi for the next two years. This will be the only nominating convention held and it is improbable that any other will be put in the field by petition. So it is important that every voter should be present.

Last year two tickets were put in the field by the same primary so as to give the voters a choice between two men for every office. Many advocate the same rule this year, while others favor naming but one ticket.

Since prohibition has cut off the city's revenue and lessened the work of the officers, it may be that a resolution will be adopted favoring the discontinuance of some positions and the consolidation of others.

## Look Out For Gypsies.

Last Saturday a band of gypsies struck Lehi. They were of the light-fingered, fortune-telling class. Entering one place they began talking volubly of fortunes, good luck, etc.; and a few moments after their departure, the owner discovered that he had lost \$30. He soon notified the officers, who had the gang rounded up in the city jail, where they consented to restore the \$30; and after fining one of their number \$20, the gang was allowed to go. After this experience they left town. Part of them were in American Fork during the day where they employed similar tactics. In the office of the Utah Power and Light Co., they jostled a party out of fifty cents which he had laid on the counter with other money for his monthly light bill. They also opened the gate and attempted to reach a sack of money in the safe; but prevented by the prompt action of the office force. Some of them were rounded up in jail in American Fork, and taken back to Lehi.




