## Apples Bring Good Prices

Reduced Crop Makes Good Demand—Some Local Growers Have Good Yields—Roylance and Co. Only Ones Shipping From Pleasant Grove.

The apple crop is now being harvested. It is not as large as usual for the past several years, but the prices are holding up well, the growers being paid \$1.00 per box for the better grades. Jonathans, Rome Beauties, Winesaps, Ganos and Ben Davis are the principal kinds being shipped. Roylance and Co. are the only people shipping from Pleasant Grove. In most instances, the packing is being done in the orchards and loaded directly into the car.

Those having the larger orchards this year are W. H. Homer, Jr., Otto Frampton, John Ellis, William Stewart, Isaac Carlson and Smith Bros. Others having smaller crops are bringing them to the Canning Company's building which has been rented by Roylance for packing plant purposes.

Reports from reliable sources show that the apple crop all over the country is much less than normal this year. Some authorities say there will be a good demand for apples at \$1.50 per box at Christmas time.

The Utah Fruit Growers Association is shipping from Provo and some growers east of town are shipping through this association.
