ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING LOTTERIES AND MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON OR PERSONS TO OPERATE, HAVE IN POSSESSION, PLAY AT, TAKE ANY CHANCE WITH, OR IN ANY MANNER BE CONNECTED WITH OR HAVE ANYTHING WHATSOEVER TO DO WITH LOTTERIES.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Pleasant Grove City, Utah County, State of Utah:

Section 1.—LOTTERY DEFINED. A lottery is any scheme, device, or mechanism for the disposal or distribution of any article or thing of value or any property of any kind whatever by chance, to or among persons who have paid or promised to pay any valuable consideration for the chance of obtaining such article, thing of value or property or any portion of it, or for any share or any interest in such article, thing of value or property upon any agreement, understanding or expectation it is to be distributed or disposed of by lot or chance, whether called a lottery, raffle, or gift enterprise or by whatever name the same may be known.

Section 2.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to operate, have in possession, play at, take any chance with, or to be in any manner interested in or connected with or have anything whatever to do with the management or operation of any lottery.

Section 3.—Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment in the City Jail for a period of not more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Passed by the City Council of Pleasant Grove City, this 15th day of November, 1915, and ordered to take effect immediately.
