The following letter will be an explanation to those who do not already know that the 50 cents is to cover local expenses:

Logan, May 26, 1915.
Mr. Clifford E. Young,
American Fork, Utah.

Dear Sir:

Dr. Peterson referred the letters relative to the holding of a Round-up, to me. We are arranging our schedule at the present time for the Round-ups and Institutions to be held next year, and would like to have something more definite from your section before a date is decided on. We are quite sure that we cannot see our way clear to give you two weeks next year as the regular Round-ups we find are taking practically all of our appropriation. We could, however, if you would guarantee 150 to 200 people at 50 cents each, give you a one week school, which in the scheme we are using in most sections. Will write to Mr. Southwick today and take the matter up with him, as everything of this kind which happens in your section is supposed to be under Mr. Southwick's and Mr. Ballantyne's direction.
