## MRS. HARRIET A. JACOBS ANSWERS LAST CALL

Was Member of Prominent Family, An Early Settler and a Devoted Church Worker.

Funeral services for Mrs. Harriet Austin Jacobs were held in the Tabernacle Wednesday at 2 o'clock p. m. The large attendance, the many beautiful floral offerings, the resolutions of respect and the eulogies paid to her character attested the high esteem in which she is held by the community.

Bishop James H. Gardner presided over the services and the ward choir furnished the music. The speaker were:

President A. J. Evans, Edward Southwick, President S. L. Chipman, Bishop Blake of Sugar City and Joseph W. McMurrin of Salt Lake. Mr. Sadie Kittinger sang a solo, Arthur Livingston and Mrs. Jennie Webb duet and Miss Marie Nelson a solo. A. R. Anderson gave the invocation and Bishop J. R. Hindley the benediction.

Mrs. Jacobs was born in Bedfordshire, England, 68 years ago. She was baptized a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saint when 8 years of age. In 1866 she and her brother, George Austin, emigrated to Utah, crossing the plains in Henry Chipman's company. Two years later her parents, John and Emma Grace Austin and the other members of the family followed, all locating in Lehi. The year following her arrival in Lehi she was married to John Jacobs, Lehi's present oldest citizen and one of its first settlers. The result of their union was ten children, but three of whom are living, Frank and Leo Jacobs of Sugar City, and Mrs. Della Lott of this city.

She was Lehi's first milliner and most of the citizen of Lehi, particularly the ladies, have worn some of her handwork. She was active in church matters, for years being an officer in the Sunday schools and Primary association. She was a member of the Stake Relief Society presidency when the stake was first organized, being counselor to Mrs. Durrant. She held this position also under Mrs. Rebecca Standing and until the reorganization about four years ago.

She has the following brothers and sisters, all of whom were present: George Austin of Salt Lake, Agricultural Superintendent of the Utah-Idaho Sugar Co.; Parley Austin, district superintendent of the same company in Lehi; William Austin also of Lehi; Mark Austin, president of the Fremont stake in Idaho; Heber Austin, president of the Bingham stake, Thomas Austin and John Austin of the Austr Bros. company of Salt Lake City; Mrs. Julia Brown, Mrs. Annie Munns of Garland and Mrs. Leticia Gudmundsen of Lehi.

Her son, Frank, was filling a mission in Greeley, Colorado, when his mother died, and arrived in time for the funeral.

Calne, III, and Ben E'dridge. The meetings were largely attended and the farmers are loud in acclaiming the good ideas that were brought out.

Sunday evening the question of Rural credits was discussed, Monday's meeting was devoted to poultry and the astonishing statement was made that the poultry and egg crop in America was the third largest farmer crop grown. Tuesday was devoted to Dry Farming and at the request of several present we give some figures presented by Mr. Paxman, who is acknowledged to be the best authority in Utah.

### Program of Work

Sept. 1 to Sept. 30, Harrowing and Drilling 160 acres (20 days at rate of 8 acres per day.)

Oct. 1 to Oct. 15, Plowing 100 acres stubble (30 days at rate of 3 1-3 acres per day.)

Nov. 15 to March 15, 4 1/2 months off the farm to earn feed for the team, making improvements, repairing etc.

April 1 to April 15, Harrowing 100 acres fallow (10 days at 10 acres per day.)

April 15 to April 25, Harrowing 160 acres grain (8 days at 20 acres per day.)

April 25 to May 25, Plowing and harrowing 60 acres stubble (20 days at rate of 3 acres per day.)

May 25 to June 30, Cultivating (or plowing) and harrowing 100 acres fallow, (25 days at rate of 4 acres per day.)

July 1 to July 5 Harrowing 60 acres fallow (3 days at rate of 20 acres day.)

July 5 to July 15, Recruiting forces, repairing, and preparing for harvest.)

July 15 to August 15, Heading 400 acres for self and co-partners (20 days at rate of 20 acres per day.)

August 15 to September 1, Threshing and storing or marketing crop.

## LEHI WINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP

Over 2,000 people, the largest crowd that ever witnessed a basket ball game in Utah County, crowded into the Smuin Academy to witness Lehi defeat Pleasant Grove with a score of 47 to 22. In the last game of the Alpine division series for the division championship. Each team, prior to this game had lost but one game and won eight. Pleasant Grove had defeated Lehi at Pleasant Grove and Heber had defeated Pleasant Grove at Heber. Three hundred came over from Pleasant Grove and two hundred from American Fork. The air was surcharged with enthusiasm, Lehi would sing a school song, then their silver band would play, then Pleasant Grove would sing, and then each school would do its best to out do the other with class yells, and between the music, yells and antics of the yell masters the big crowd was kept in good humor till the game commenced.

Lehi led off with three field baskets before Pleasant Grove seemed to find itself and never at any time did the visitors approach an even score. Wanlass was easily the star of the evening, with 23 points to his credit, one more than the total of the opponents entire team. Taylor did great work, besides successfully guarding his man he scored 10 points. Gray also made 10 points. Gardner did not pitch a basket, yet was so successful in his guard work that he was entitled to be called a star. Clark did fine work at center, besides shutting his man out he scored 4 points.

Of the visitors West was easily the star, but was guarded so closely that he only got 13 points. Harvey got the other nine. Paul Walker, Pleasant Grove's center, had had his knee in a plaster cast for 4 days and took it off to come to Lehi, his playing showed it too, for he could get neither speed nor skill and was taken out in the first half. Leo Walker who was substituted at center was too young, both in years and experience to take the elder Walker's place. While it is likely that the gilt edged ball that Coach Miner's men put up would have won the game for Lehi, unquestionably the weakening of Pleasant Grove's center had much to do with the more than two to one score.
