CANNING COMPANY CONTRACTS FOR BEANS AND TOMATOES

Baltimore and Maryland Tomatoes Will be Planted, Also Seven Acres of Beans.

The Canning factory this week received sufficient tomato seed to plant 60 acres and has already signed up for about this acreage with local farmers. They will get the other 50 acres the coming week. Fifteen acres of beans will also be signed up and planted soon as all danger of frost is over. Those who intend planting tomatoes should plant them in properly constructed hot beds at once so they may be transplanted into cold frames and matured ready to set out about May 10. The Baltimore and Maryland varieties are the kinds that will be grown.

Several machinery men have been in town this week to take orders for the new machinery that will be needed. It has now all been ordered and things are rapidly shaping for a busy season. Fruits will also be packed if there is a good supply, which is now indicated by the fast forming buds.

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE amending Chapter 11 of the Revised Ordinances of Pleasant Grove City, passed September 2nd, 1905, relating to the keeping, registration and running at large of dogs, by amending Section 73 of said Chapter 11 and Ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of Pleasant Grove City:

Section 1. That Chapter 11 of the Revised Ordinances of Pleasant Grove City be amended by amending Section 73 of said Chapter and Ordinance as follows:

73. TAX. Every person owning or having in charge any dog or bitch within the corporate limits of this city shall pay for the use of the city, an annual tax of one dollar for every such dog and two dollars for every such bitch, and it shall be unlawful for any person to own or possess, keep or harbor, on, in or about his or her premises, or elsewhere within the limits of Pleasant Grove City, any dog or bitch not registered and colored as hereinafter provided.

Passed by the City Council of Pleasant Grove City, this 6th day of March, 1916.
