UTAH CENTENNIAL WILL CUT LOOSE

Property is Being Financed in Salt Lake by Prominent Mining Men—May Soon Be Listed.

The Utah Centennial Mining Co. is preparing to actively commence developing their property on Pittsburg Hill in American Fork canyon Monday. This property is some of the best located property in the Canyon, lying on a line between the Pacific and the Pittsburg it apparently would be the Pacific fissure if it continues its present northerly strike. It has a cross fissure coming from the Old Miller Hill. It has the Pittsburg contact of lime shale and argillite and is cut with two big porphyry dykes. Besides this it has some ore in the workings and well-located miners say that the property headed in the right direction to be a good mine.

PLEASANT GROVE MEN MINING ZINC ORE

Frank and Jacob Nielson Leasing on Old Miller Hill—Have Three Cars Ready For Shipment.

Jacob and Frank Nielson came from the old Wyoming Mine in American Fork Canyon Monday to make arrangements to commence mining ore from their lease on the time bonanza. The Nielson's already have over three car loads of ore on the dump ready to send down apparently twice as much more as ready to mine.

Their ore is a casing to an old mine on the Mormon tunnel side of the hill and it is said that a half million dollars worth of silver-lead ore was taken out of the stope in the early days. The Nielson boys have cleaned the dirt so that the taking out of the ore is now an easy matter, there being no overburden. The deposit has the appearance of a crater.

The ore on the dump is worth about \$100 per ton on board the cars at American Fork. It is sent to Joplin Missouri for treatment, where is located the center of the zinc industry of the world. There are hundreds of tons of ore on the hill of a second class which will a little more than present prices, and if the shipment this also will be shipped. Up to the present time the deep has prevented making any shipment.

NOTICE

Notice is hereby given by the City Council of Pleasant Grove City, a Municipal Corporation of the State of Utah, of the intention of said Council to make the following described improvements within Sidewalk Paving District No. 2 as designated and described in a resolution passed by said Council on the 6th day of June, 1916:

To lay cement sidewalks within said district as follows:

Commencing at the northwest corner of Block 17 and running thence east on the south side of First South Street and north of Blocks 17 and 16 to a point opposite the west line of Center Street.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 19 and running thence east on the north side of First South Street, south of Blocks 19, 20, 21, 22 and 23 to a point opposite the east side of Locust Avenue thence south-easterly along the east side of Locust Avenue to the south boundary line of the lands of Elias Pierce.

Also, commencing at the northeast corner of Block 1 and running thence southeasterly on the west side of Locust Avenue and the northeast side of Block 1 to the south boundary line of the lands of E. D. Olpin.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 35 and running thence east along the north side of Main St., south of Blocks 35, 34, 33, 32, 31 to the east side of First East Street.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 31-A and running thence east on the north side of First North Street on the south side of Block 31-A and to the east side of First East Street.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 20 and running thence

North on the east side of Second West Street along the west side of Blocks 20, 33, 37, 48 and 52 to a point opposite the north side of Cemetery Street.

Also, commencing at the southeast corner of Block 20 and running thence north on the west side of First West St. and on the east side of Blocks 20 and 33 to the south side of First North Street.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 23 and running thence north on the east side of First East Street on the west side of Blocks 23, 30, 36, 45, 55, 62 and 69 to the south side of Sixth North Street.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 21 and running thence north on the east side of First West Street on the west side of Blocks 21 and 32 to the north side of First North Street.

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of Block 22 and running thence north on the east side of Center St. on the west side of Blocks 22, 31 and 31-A to the south side of Second North Street, thence east on the south side of Second North Street on the north side of Block 31-A to the existing pavement.

Also, commencing at the southeast corner of Block 31-A and running thence north on the west side of First East Street on the east side of Blocks 31-A, 46 and 54 to the south side of Fourth North Street.

Also, commencing at the southeast corner of Block 54, thence west on the north side of Third North Street and south of Blocks 54, 53 and 52 to the east side of Second West Street.

Also, commencing at the north side of First North Street at the intersection of the west side of Third West Street, thence northwest on the north side of State Road on the south side of Block 36 to the west side of Fourth West Street, thence north on the west side of Fourth West Street, on the east side of Block 50 to the north side of Cemetery Street, thence east on the north side of Cemetery Street to the west side of Second West Street on the south side of Cemetery Block, thence north on the west side of Second West Street on the east side of Cemetery Block to the south side of Fifth North Street.

Also, commencing at the Northeast corner of Block 16, thence South along the west side of Center Street, on the East side of Blocks 16, 6 and 2 to State Road.

Also, commencing at the Southwest corner of Block 46, thence north along the east side of Center Street on the west side of Blocks 46, 54, 63 and 68 to the South side of Sixth North St.

Also, commencing at the intersection of First South and Fourth West Streets, thence North along the West side of Fourth West Street on the East side of Block 4 to the North side of the State Road.

The boundaries of said District No. 2 are the lines of the city lots within the blocks above named forming the sides of the streets designated running parallel therewith.

Said sidewalk shall be five feet wide and the abuttor's proportionate cost and expense of making said improvements, estimated at \$17,727.60 or approximately sixty-eight cents per linear foot (there being approximately 26070 linear feet abutting property in said paving district) shall be defrayed by local assessments upon the lots and lands abutting upon said improvements and embraced within said paving district to the extent of the benefits to such property by reason of such improvements.

All protests and objections to carrying out of such intention must be presented in writing, stating lot and block, or other description of property, to the City Recorder of Pleasant Grove City, on or before the 12th day of July A. D. 1916, which is the date fixed by said City Council when it will hear and consider such protests and objections as may be made thereto, such hearing to be had at the Council Chamber of said council at the City Hall in Pleasant Grove City, Utah, beginning at the hour of 7 o'clock P. M. of said day.
