

# REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES You Will Vote For Next Tuesday, Nov. 7th



W. A. KNIGHT

W. A. Knight, Candidate for Republican State Representative was born in Salt Lake City, 1876, of a pioneer family, educated in the public and church schools. Served his time as a Blacksmith's apprentice. Is secretary and director of the Knight Carriage and Auto Co. Spent four years' time for the last 15 years has been identified with the Associated Engineers and Mechanics. He has been in that time he has built and operated their pumping plant and put several large dams in connection with their system. Has made irrigation a study and understands many of its problems. He feels that funds available to the state should be loaned to the farmers for the building of irrigation projects so they might receive the benefits of the first cost. He believes we should be economical and that appropriations by the legislature should be well within the revenues of the state. He favors reduction of taxation, particularly a reference to small homes and farms. He considers our platform pledges sacred promises and if elected will work for their fulfillment. GEORGE P. PARKER

There is no attorney in this part of the State whom the people generally better acquainted with than they are with George P. Parker. Being born and raised in this county, his whole record is known to practically every voter. Still it may not be out of place to state a few of the facts in Mr. Parker's career. He was born of American Fork, thirty years ago. After completing the district school course, he attended Brigham Young University, graduating with honor from that institution in 1906. Immediately after graduating he accepted a position as bookkeeper for the Elison Mill Elevator Company, in Alberta, Canada. He remained at this position until he had saved sufficient money to enable him to complete his college course, and in the fall of 1908 entered the law department of the University of Michigan, graduating from this institution in 1911. Immediately after completing his college course, Mr. Parker began practicing in Provo, and just four years ago, in connection with J. W. Robinson, organized the firm of Parker & Robinson. This firm has already come to be recognized as one of the best firms in this part of the State. As we all know, Mr. Parker was overwhelmingly elected to the office of County Attorney two years ago. It is therefore in order to say something concerning his record as County Attorney. This we are proud to do for, in reviewing Mr. Parker's record, several facts stand out conspicuously: (1)—As legal advisor for the County Commissioners he has never gone wrong. Not once have

the commissioners been forced to retrace their steps because of an error on Mr. Parker's account; (2)—He has never failed once in his whole administration to bind a prisoner over to the District Court; (3)—He has convicted every prisoner he has tried in the Justice's Court, save two. This fact makes it clear that Mr. Parker has been very judicious in issuing criminal complaints, but when he has almost invariably succeeded in convicting. In general Mr. Parker's policy has been (1)—to enforce the law rigidly; (2)—To run his office as economically as possible while at the same time maintaining the highest possible efficiency.

J. L. NELSON

J. L. Nelson, county treasurer, was born in Provo, Utah, October 1, 1864. He received his education at the Brigham Young University and for several years followed along mechanical lines. Mr. Nelson has held numerous civil and ecclesiastical positions. He served as city recorder from 1894 to 1899 and was deputy county treasurer for eight years from 1905 to 1908 and was elected county treasurer in 1914.



Mr. Nelson has been very popular in his public life and has served the people with the determination to give them only the best. Each year improvements have been made in accounting methods and in 1915 the books of the county were audited and found, in addition to being thoroughly up-to-date, to be in splendid and accurate condition.

Mr. Nelson is one of the stalwart Republicans of Utah County. He is efficient and his ability and amiable disposition have carried him on to success.

JAMES B. SMITH

He received his High School education at Brigham Young University of Provo and took out his degree of Bachelor of Science in mining engineering at the School of Mines in the University of Utah.

Mr. Stewart has been associated on numerous contracts amounting to large sums of money and covering almost every portion of the state.

He is particularly familiar with Utah Valley as his work for Uncle Sam two years ago was the establishing and re-establishing of government lines in this county. Added to his technical knowledge of this section, Mr. Stewart, as a member of the firms of Stewart and Sons and Stewart and Stewart, Civil and Mining Engineers, has gained a wide experience

in general engineering in the lines of irrigation, railroad location, mining surveys, etc.

During the past two years Mr. Stewart has been County Engineer and in that capacity has taken a live interest in the road of the County. He is one of the original boosters of the now popular Timpanogos loop and has made a thorough study of concrete roads throughout the country; also as the main State Highway through the County will more than likely be paved during the next two years his assistance will be especially valuable.

Served as mayor for two terms when the prohibition ordinance was first adopted, and had the opposition of the most belligerent ex-saloon keepers known in this county. At one critical time during the prosecution of liquor cases

when the whole city council wavered, Mr. Cooper stood out alone for the vigorous enforcement of the prohibitory law.

During the time he attended the University of Utah he took a prominent part in debating, was editor of the University Chronicle, and was President of his class at the time of graduation. At the time of his graduation Levi Edgar Young, who was a professor in the history department of the University of Utah, was in Germany on a mission, and Elias Hansen was employed to fill the vacancy, during Mr. Young's absence. Upon the return of Mr. Young to the University, Mr. Hansen was transferred to the Branch Normal School of the University of Utah at Cedar City, where he taught mathematics and history for a period of four years. He studied law while engaged in teaching, and attended the Law School of the University of Chicago for a period of two years. He was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of this state in 1908, and has been engaged in the practice of his profession for the past seven years, during which time he has served as city attorney for Spanish Fork City.

MARION CLINGER

Marion Clinger, Republican candidate for Sheriff, was born June 13, 1874 in Lake View, Utah. He was educated in the public schools and was a student of the Brigham Young University for six years, being called from that institution to fill a mission to the Southern States in 1896.



He was married to Rebecca Dorius of Ephraim, Utah, three weeks before leaving. He is the father of five boys and five girls. He labored in the superintendency of the Lake View Sunday School and the presidency of the Y. M. M. I. A. for a number of years. He labored as counselor in the Bishopric of Lake View for eleven years.

He is a consistent citizen, a republican and a strong advocate of prohibition by example and precept. He is a strong advocate of the worth of the juvenile law and thinks that the office of County Sheriff should work in harmony with the juvenile officers and various city officers.

If elected he pledges himself and deputies to enforce the liquor law as well as all others on the statute books. He is a believer of County officers being out in the county, giving all parts protection and needed assistance, rather than having them remaining at the office awaiting calls.
