## AN ART SCHOOL IN AMERICAN FORK CANYON

If present plans mature, the University of Utah will establish an art school in American Fork canyon during the summer months, where artists from all over the West will come to reproduce some of the prettiest views to be found in the west. At least, the proposition for these plans have been placed before the American Fork Commercial Club by Dana Parkinson, state forest supervisor. The Commercial Club here will be asked to furnish transportation for the students and their provisions to camp. The University has secured the use of the National guard tents for the use of the art students, and if the Commercial Club gets behind the matter, it is probable the end of the summer will see many of the beautiful canyon scenes placed upon canvas. This, of itself would be a big boost for American Fork and its canyon. The proposition was taken up by the club and discussed at the regular meeting in the Club rooms Thursday night.

During the past season the Commercial club did much to put American Fork City and its canyon into prominence.

## ALPINE SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS

The regular meeting of the Alpine school board was held in the office here Tuesday night.

Dr. F. M. Kelly and others representing the library committee of American Fork, met and asked that the school combine their civic center with the library to be built here this summer. The matter was taken under advisement, and the local member, Dr. Noyes, was appointed to make legal investigations.

Mr. J. B. Forbes was appointed as assistant librarian and substitute teacher for the district.

A communication was read from Francis W. Kirkham, state vocational advisor stating that the state would be willing to pay \$125.00 per month for ten vocational teachers in the district. They will look after summer activities and the students will be given credit for their work. The board accepted the proposition and will make plans later for this work.

Plans were read for the joint conventions of school teachers from Provo, Alpine, Nebo, and Wasatch districts which was held at Provo Feb. 18th.

## CENTRAL UTAH BASE BALL LEAGUE

Much interest and enthusiasm is being shown in the organization of the Central Utah base ball league this year. Two new teams will be admitted. They are Payson and Nephi.

The local team, with Mayor Walker as their manager, have met several times and everything points forward to another championship team this summer. Most of the old team are still with us and the club will be as strong as ever. Miller is back from California and is in fine shape, it is stated.

The club this year will be incorporated. A committee who was appointed to draw up the articles of incorporation met Friday when final arrangements were made.

## Services for Mrs. Geo. Shelton

Funeral services were held Sunday at the 30th ward in Salt Lake for Mrs. George Shelton, 68 years of age, mother of Wm. Shelton of this city and sister to Mrs. Sarah Wootton, also of this city. ## FARMERS HEAR DAIRY QUESTION DISCUSSED

A crowd of over 125 farmers met at the City Hall, Friday afternoon to hear Ben. R. Eldridge and others talk on the dairy question. Mr. Eldridge was the main speaker of the afternoon. He gave first a history of the dairy business in Utah. He then gave an account of its growth and the future outlook. He said that the present method of putting cattle on the summer range in the hills and feeding them in the winter was not netting the farmers one dollar per head. This stock raising business should be replaced with a good dairy business, he went on to say, and that the present milk condensary in our town affords ample opportunity to find sale for the milk. He also stated that while at present there was a slump in the milk market at Salt Lake City, that there was plenty of market throughout the United States and that Denmark was today shipping in enormous amounts of dairy products which should be supplied by our own farmers.

Mr. Fisher of the Mutual Creamery Co., stated that there was always a market for the milk and the company was depending on the farmers for the successful operation of their plant here. He stated that they expected to commence operating their new plant here by the first of May at first as a skimming plant.

Harry Chipman, Hans Christensen and Washburn Chipman were appointed as a purchasing committee. The banks will advance the farmers the necessary funds to buy the stock, provided good security is given. No special breed of cattle was decided upon, but it was decided that when they were bought, they would be all of the same kind.

Representatives of the Manila, Lehi, Pleasant Grove and Lindon bureaus were present and will take the report of the meeting to their respective bureaus.

## M. I. A. HUT IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

Word was given out by the Stake M. I. A. board Wednesday that Superintendent Warnick and others had made the trip to Mutual Dell to find out the condition of the M. I. A. hut there. They went horseback as far as possible and then by snow shoes to the hut. They found it in excellent condition, just as they had left it last fall.

It seems that some one had started a false rumor that the hut had caved in, due to the heavy snow. It is not known who started this rumor or why, but the stake board members decided to find out the truth and that was why the trip was made this week.
